I was at the beach on the long weekend with my family and it was fantastic to see so many people from our community out together enjoying the sun.

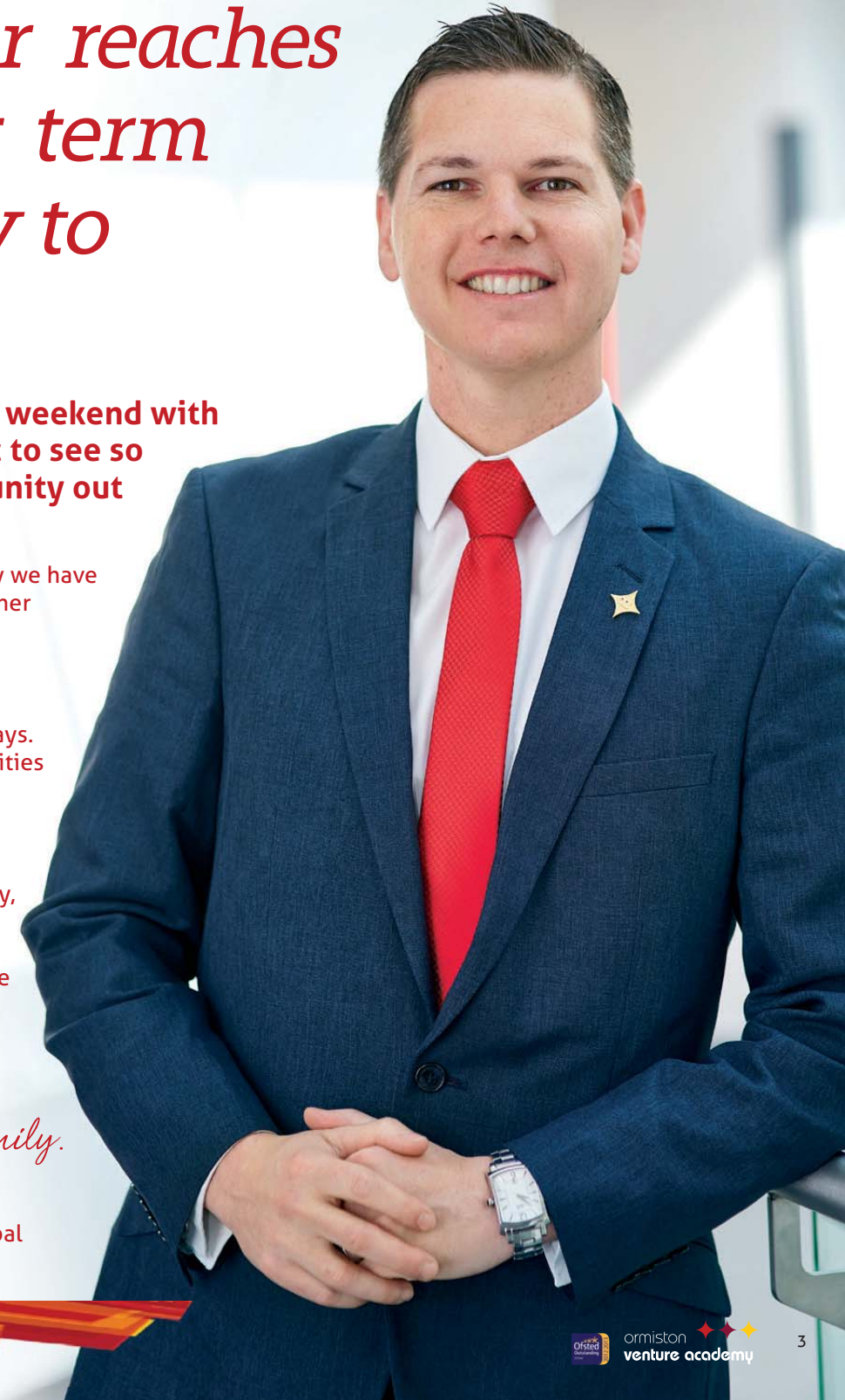
It reminded me of the fantastic community we have at Venture. A community that comes together to support one another and truly shines in so many ways.

SCHOOL REPORT 2018

Resident Reporters Take The Lead In...



Ormiston Venture Academy has recruited 'resident reporters' for the academy - and they take the form of five radio producers and eight print journalists.



This year, the Union Of Venture Students invested in a fully functioning radio station, much to the students' excitement, and has plans to set up regular shows that can be broadcast at lunch times and 'on air' outside of the school walls.

This is part of a wider literacy project in which the academy works to secure better speaking and listening skills for every student - the station will be entirely student run in order to give them a taste of independence and creative freedom.

The initial 'media cooperative' at the academy ranges from year seven students, who are in their first year of secondary education, to year ten students who will be taking their GCSEs next year.

The BBC School Report Day was a chance for the students to launch their radio station, write scripts for regular shows and update their Venture E-Magazine with current online news stories.

The Leader of Literacy at the academy, Amy Fordham, who is an ex-journalist herself, spent the day with the keen students teaching them news techniques.

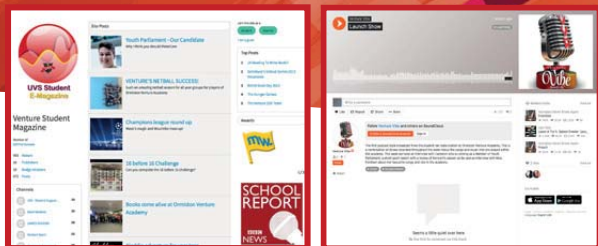
This included discussing how to hold a reader's attention, creating eye-catching headlines and planning for 'chatty' and relatable radio that listeners can get behind.

She says:

"One of the best things about the day was seeing the older students coaching the younger ones on accurate writing skills and time management. Each student had a set amount of stories that they needed to report on throughout the day and deadlines to meet. When the younger students felt the pressure, the older students jumped in to boost their confidence and walk them through it. The students thoroughly enjoyed the day and really got a lot out of it."



On Wednesday 31st January, Anthony McGowan, critically acclaimed author and journalist, visited Ormiston Venture Academy in Gorleston.

Anthony gave a presentation to Year 9 students with tales from his published books, retold important passages from his own life and experiences, and took some exceptionally well-thought-out questions from students.

Anthony stayed on to work with a specially selected group of students after his presentation to help unlock their inner creativity and promote writing. He focused on specific techniques and strategies based around writing novels.

Two students, Rye Johnson and Bethany Hirst, received a signed copy of one of Anthony's published books - Rye for asking the most pertinent 'Question of the Day' and Bethany for writing the 'Most Remarkable Beginning of a Story'.

This visit was organised in conjunction with the 'Take Your Place' programme, a scheme organised by the Network for East Anglian Collaborative Outreach (NEACO), which aims to support more young people from under-represented backgrounds to progress into higher education.

Andrew Underwood, the event organiser and NEACO Higher Education Champion, said:

"There is clear evidence to show that young people who develop a love for reading are more likely to progress on to higher education. This project is a great example of what can happen when schools and universities work together to showcase different opportunities on offer to young people when they reach higher education."



Ian McNally, Assistant Principal of Ormiston Venture Academy, said:

"This is such an important opportunity for these students - the joy and understanding of language was really emphasised by Mr McGowan. Whichever pathway these students choose to follow, the value of being able to understand language, visualise scenarios and read between the lines will be key skills to master."

“Sea History Differently” project comes to Ormiston Venture Academy

Ormiston Venture Academy in Gorleston, Great Yarmouth, has teamed up with Time and Tide Museum of Great Yarmouth Life to deliver a project to provide the academy’s students with a week of presentations and workshops based around Great Yarmouth’s local heritage and the fishing industry.

The project – Sea History Differently – is providing students with the opportunity to examine many exciting mystery objects from Great Yarmouth’s past, as well as photographs and paintings. Students have also had the chance to participate in “guess the object’s weight” competitions, which have proved very popular.

Jennifer Hooker, a project assistant at Time and Tide Museum of Great Yarmouth Life, set the students a variety of follow-up tasks to get them really engaged and thinking about the history involved.

Phoebe Wingate, a Cultural Capacity officer at Norfolk County Council, also worked with the students to observe how projects like this can get students excited and engaged about history, and gained ideas for similar school projects which could be implemented across Norfolk.

Jennifer Hooker, project assistant at Time and Tide Museum of Great Yarmouth Life, said:

“It’s fantastic to see so many young people engaging with the museum in their school and their response so far has been incredible!”

“Hearing young people tell stories of their relatives who have worked in the fishing industry has been a joy and shows that the heritage of the town is still very vibrant.”

Ian McNally, Assistant Principal at Ormiston Venture Academy, said:

“We are extremely grateful to Time and Tide Museum of Great Yarmouth Life, for opening the students’ eyes to the amazing culture and history our local area has to offer. The exhibits they have brought in have been stunning and really thought provoking. We look forward to seeing this develop in future years.”



Phoebe Wingate, Cultural Capacity officer at Norfolk County Council, said:

“It’s been energising breaking down museum myths to show that museums are fun and a great opportunity to learn for the next generation.”

“It has been truly wonderful to be able to engage with such a wide range of young people at Ormiston Venture Academy - the Sea History Differently project is all about breaking down barriers to museum collections and taking them into unexpected spaces.

“It is really fantastic that we have been so warmly welcomed to deliver our ‘pop up museum’ where the students can get hands on with collections.”





The grandeur and history of the building (dating back from the 14th Century) had students in awe. Joshua Kerrison said he preferred this type of university to the modern ones. Students took selfies outside the office Stephen Hawking used when he was at the university to begin an appreciation of the sheer amount of successful and famous people who have studied and worked at Cambridge.

Mr McNally commented that it 'was a wonderful opportunity to open students' eyes to what an elite university experience could be like, and that these students are on track for a future like this if they continue to work hard and strive for the very best.'

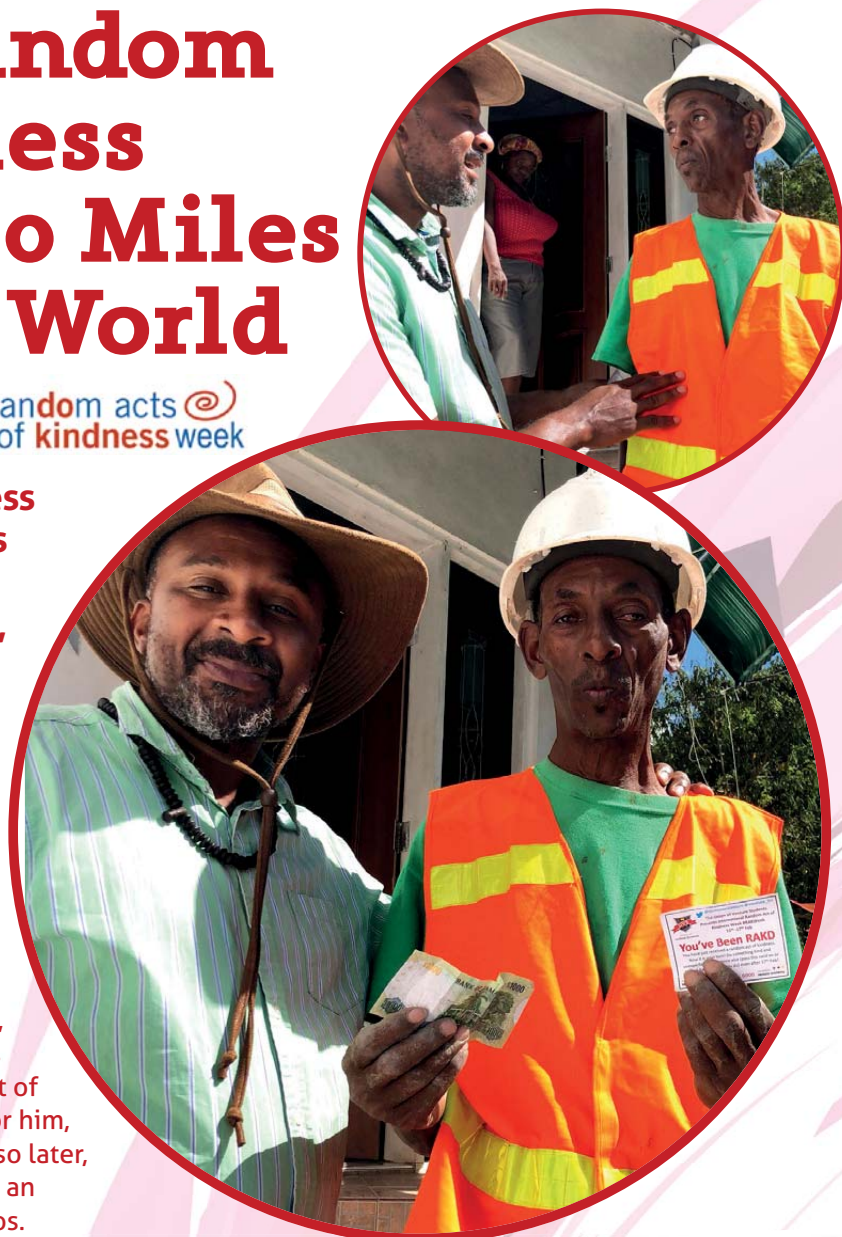
Principal Simon Gilbert-Barnham said "We are all so proud of Emily and Cameron. To have two students from Venture receive scholarships is incredible".

Venture's Random Act of Kindness Makes It 4760 Miles Around The World

Students and staff at Ormiston Venture Academy have recently celebrated Random Acts of Kindness Week, by creating handmade cards and handing them out around the academy and the local community, with the hope that the recipients will then pass the kindness on to someone else.



Each year, the academy is proud to see and hear the examples of 'acts of kindness' taking place, and where they travel to across the UK, and in this year's case, across the world.

This year, the academy had a particularly heart warming and special example, thanks to Year 7 student Mia Gore. A gentleman, named Stephen, had been carrying out some repair work in Mia's house, when Mia decided to use her Random Act of Kindness card, and carried his tools to his van for him, shortly before handing him the card. A week or so later, Mia's Mother received a text from Stephen, with an update on the card including the attached photos.

Stephen was visiting Jamaica to see his family and whilst he was there, gave the card and \$1000 gift to a worker at his father's house, to help with some medical bills and so that he could do something nice with his son. As a result, the Random Act of Kindness card is now being circulated around Dallas Castle, Saint Andrew in Jamaica which equates to a new distance record for our the academy's cards reach, smashing the previous record of Newcastle in the UK (215 miles from Venture), and now standing at 4760 miles between Venture and Saint Andrew in Jamaica.

The huge mileage has set the academy a great challenge to try and beat next year and all the motivation that the Union need to keep growing and expanding their efforts around Random Act of Kindness week. The Union would like to say a huge thank you to Mia and Stephen for getting the card so far and for making a difference with a Random Act of Kindness.



The ROBOTS are taking over Ormiston Venture!!!!

Over 120 of our year 8's had a "fun and engaging" time learning how to program a robot.

This involved the UEA visiting us with 24 Lego Mindstorm robots.

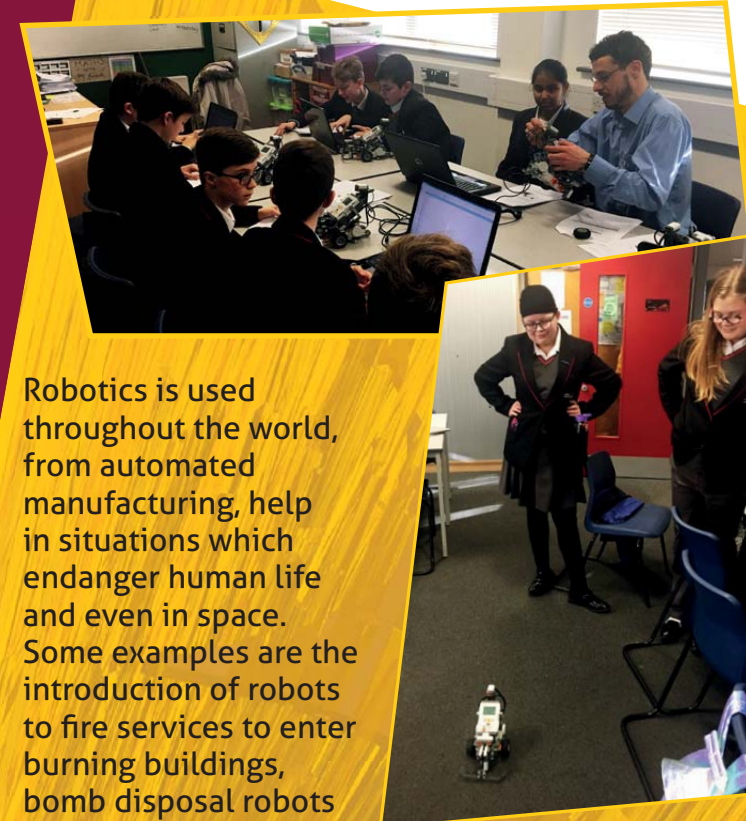
The sessions were led by UEA staff, Dr Carl Harrington Outreach Academic Officer and student Joseph Shepherd, who is doing a computational based PhD.

Dr Harrington said "The Lego robotics session delivered by staff from the UEA Outreach Office and School of Computing Sciences gave students the opportunity to experience robotic programming in a fun and engaging way. Together with a talk about university at the start of the day, the event at Ormiston Venture Academy allowed students to explore both what university is in general and studying computer sciences specifically."

Robotics is used throughout the world, from automated manufacturing, help in situations which endanger human life and even in space. Some examples are the introduction of robots to fire services to enter burning buildings, bomb disposal robots and un-manned drone aircraft for military use.

Head of Faculty, Kyran Smith said about the event

"This allowed our pupils to experience how to program the robots to perform a range of actions, from navigating from 'A' to 'B,' to more complex movement. More importantly, our year 8 learners have been exposed to the possible and likely future, where robotics will be fundamental to everyday living. Overall, the event has given our learners a taster on the vast array on employment opportunities in Computer Science that they do not see often."



Ormiston Venture Academy hosts Diana Award anti-bullying training session

Ormiston Venture Academy in Gorleston this week welcomed over 100 secondary school staff and students from across six different counties to an event designed to provide the knowledge and know-how required to become Anti-Bullying Ambassadors, as accredited by the Diana Award Anti-Bullying Campaign.

The Diana Award Anti-Bullying Campaign, supported by HRH The Duke of Cambridge, is a programme designed to promote peer to peer support and help students and staff recognise signs when someone is being bullied, both online and offline.

15 pupils from Ormiston Venture Academy from Years 8 to 10 were involved in this training and are now on their way to becoming peer mentors at the academy.

Run by Paul Hanmore and Patrick Kerrigan from the Diana Award, the day comprised of many different workshops and activities covering everything from cyberbullying to bullying in the classroom and workplace.

The Ambassadors were trained to develop a range of preventative measures to keep their peers safe, including delivering online safety techniques to parents and staff.



Ambassadors were also advised on how they can help rewrite their school's anti-bullying policy through implementing measures such as "Smile and Compliment days", drop in support sessions, and anti-bullying patrols.



Owen Cooper, Head of Upper School at Ormiston Venture Academy and event organiser, said:

"This is always such an insightful and educational day for both students and staff. It helps empower young people to work together to make not only their school but their community a better place. This training, led by The Diana Award, helps to ensure schools and communities have the dedicated up-to-date training needed for staff and students in both online and offline anti-bullying strategies."

Tamzin Lockyer, another Year 10 Ormiston Venture student who attended the session, said:
"It was truly inspiring to see how enthusiastic children are towards wanting to change people's lives by preventing bullying"



Paul Hanmore, the Anti-Bullying Training Manager for The Diana Award, said:

We have been coordinating with Owen Cooper for over six years and he has been able to help us bring this campaign into his new school. We were impressed at the commitment of the young people in being able to engage in positive social action to make a real difference to their schools. We feel confident in their ability in carrying on Princess Diana's legacy of compassion, kindness and service to others in their campaigns they will be running themselves."

Erin French, a Year 10 student at Ormiston Venture Academy who attended the session, said:

"It was an extremely well-structured day and kept us engaged with the tasks that were set, as they were each unique and intriguing. Everyone was so friendly and encouraging, making us feel confident with our opinions and ideas about how to deal or prevent bullying."

The second day started with the group having an hour in the DDR Museum before it opened to the public.

The DDR Museum shows what life was like in East Germany and is an extremely interesting and interactive learning experience.

Other activities for the day included a visit to the Berlin Memorial, a visit to Checkpoint Charlie, and a visit to the TV Tower, where the students could view Berlin from 203m high.

Berlin to Krakow continued... Day 3

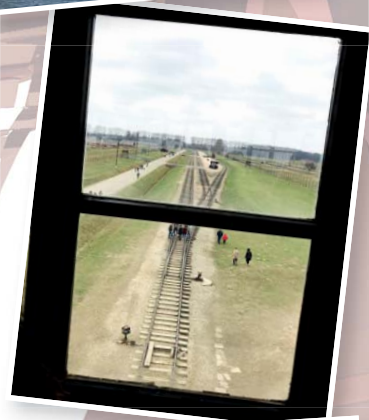
