BBC School Report Day took place nationally on Thursday 19th March. As we do every year Venture took part in submitting stories about the Academy, our local community and wider news that interested us.

A team of 30 year 7, 8 and 9 students worked tirelessly from 8:25am - 3:00pm to get their stories researched, interviews conducted, write ups finished and editing done all on tight deadlines just as a real journalist would have to. The students managed a very respectable 27 stories on the day, covering a wide range of subjects from Venture's Got Talent and Venture's SSAT award for outstanding outcomes, to Miss Smith's Marathon attempt and Miss Haddleton's Red Brick award. Everything on the day was ran and directed by students and they were superb in creating stories which were important to them.

2015 has been an important year in politics and Venture students didn't want to be left out.

In addition to having a student vote in our Head Boy and Girl elections for the first time, we also decided to run a full mock General Election on May 7th.

In the run-up to the event there were several weeks of period 5 PL sessions on the right to vote, the key issues, who the candidates were, how the political system works and the importance of democracy. We also had college collectives on the topic so that students could understand what they were voting for and why.

So after all of the run-up it was great to see conversations happening in lessons and at break time about politics and who students felt







would win and why. One of the sessions looked at what students

would do if they were Prime Minister and questions they would like to ask the candidates, both of which provided some very mature responses.

See some of the best of the 'If I were Prime Minister' responses below although there were many more and some completely opposing views:

- Lower the age to vote to 16
- Increase number of parks and community centres
- Ensure the NHS is funded fully and more research funding for major illnesses and diseases

- Make the wait for housing in refuge centres shorter
- More options for student loans to study abroad

- Stop all animal testing and cruelty
- Spend money on space exploration and surveying different planets
- Switch the pay of footballers and doctors
- Decrease the UK Debt
- Increase Foreign Aid
- Create gender neutral bathroom
- Reintroduce free and subsidised swimming
- Reverse terminal exam rule to spread exams out over longer period of time
- Lower the cost of rent for houses

Then on May 7th the students went to the polls and made their informed decisions.

We had a turnout of 82% putting shame on the rest of the country in their efforts. In the two weeks since the election we have had the



opportunity to analyse our results in comparison to the local and national picture, looked at whether the electoral system we have is fair and how a majority government is likely to function in the next five years.

We will continue to look at the political system and after the success of the mock election probably look to do similar over any referendum that may come in the next few years so that we can continue to help encourage young people to vote and to improve the political literacy of our students.

The Union of Venture Students who organised the election would also like to congratulate Brandon Lewis MP on his re-election.











We are pleased and proud to announce that this year's successful Simmons Edeco apprenticeship winner is Scott Moore. All three candidates conducted themselves admirably throughout the whole process, but the managers at Simmons Edeco felt Scott had that edge in order to gain the role.

The candidates had to write a letter of application, conduct a presentation at the Simmons Edeco site to the managers, and then answer questions in a formal interview. Scott now begins his apprenticeship which includes 3 days at College on a Mechanical Engineering course whilst working 2 days a week at

The annual apprenticeship opportunity is exclusively open to year 11 students from Ormiston Venture Academy only, and plans are in place to find next year's successful candidate already.

Scott is a regular attendee in the Raising Achievement area after the academy day and we are sure he will be a fantastic ambassador for the academy as he starts the next phase of his life. The students commented on how similar the menu's were to the ones on offer in the academy. A big focus on the players' diets is on recovery after

games and hard training sessions with extra protein and carbohydrates added to repair muscles and replenish depleted energy levels. The students found this incredibly interesting and will certainly help them with their menu designs in the future.

Ms Read, manager of the kitchens here at the academy accompanied the group, so no doubt we will soon be seeing "As eaten by Norwich City Football Club players" on boards in our own cafe in the very near future.

This is just another opportunity of how the relationship between the academy and the football club is flourishing, offering previously unobtainable experiences for our students in many different areas of the curriculum and life. A big thank you from the group goes to Miss Getvoldsen for organising the trip and Mr Chilvers for driving the group.

The hope is this will work in three ways, one is to have former students act as inspiration for current students, whether this is by becoming an Alumni of the Month, getting involved in mentoring or in Academy events around careers.

Another is to simply inform our former students of what we are now doing and include them in events we might run like shows, fetes and fundraising.

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Elizabeth Haddleton, who supports the academy's students to access university received the Route to Red Brick award at the first ceremony held by academy sponsor Ormiston Academies Trust (OAT). The award was one of nine which highlighted the achievements of students and staff in the OAT network.

The academy's nomination said: "Liz has always had the vision of raising students to higher aspirations. She has committed herself both in the classroom and the work she has done with Greshams School to ensure this becomes a reality. Her work has not only enabled students access to higher education studying medicine in South Africa, reading fine art at Oxford and other universities but also inspired a wider range of students through the ongoing partnership work she has established. This has given the opportunity for a number of our students, many of whom would never have these opportunities, to experience life at Greshams and beyond.

"It is these opportunities and the pathways she has given to so many students that we are so proud of. Retiring at the end of this academic year after a career dedicated to improving the life chances of young people in the Gorleston area we can think of no better way to recognise her exceptional achievements in this category."

Elizabeth's achievements were honoured at a special awards ceremony at the Grand Connaught Rooms in London, where she was presented with a plaque and certificate by Tim Campbell, OBE, entrepreneur and first winner of The Apprentice, and Ben Fogle author, presenter and adventurer. Attendees included politicians, top businesses and representatives from the education world, including UCAS and the universities of Oxford and Cambridge.

OAT is a non-profit academy sponsor with a vision for all young people to have the highest academic, social and practical skills to allow them to lead a fulfilling life. The OAT network now supports over 25,000 students throughout England in 30 academies.

The Trust's first awards ceremony was also a fundraising event for its Access Champion, Simon Pedley, whose role is to support the network's students to gain access to Russell Group universities. This role is believed to be the first of its kind across a group of state schools.

"It's not really about me its about our wonderful students and I was honoured to receive it on behalf of all those students who have gone out in the world and succeeded at whatever they have chosen to do"

Professor Toby Salt, Chief Executive of Ormiston Academies Trust said:

"As a network, we are determined to make the biggest difference to our students, and this event gave us the chance to celebrate just some of the exceptional staff and students we have in our academies.

"We are indebted to the work that academy staff members like Elizabeth do to support our students to succeed. We need to celebrate this and we need to nurture it, to ensure that our students all have the same opportunities as everyone else." A pupil from Ormiston Venture Academy has been awarded a full scholarship to study A Levels at Gresham's School in Holt, where she hopes to fulfil her dream of becoming a Forensic Psychologist. Brittany Purl, a fifteen year old from Belton near Gorleston will join the Sixth Form at Gresham's in September 2015. When asked what she was looking forward to about joining the School she said, "Getting the opportunity to study and mix with pupils from different backgrounds."

Douglas Robb, Headmaster at Gresham's said, "Gresham's is delighted to have identified our sixth Ormiston scholar to study here. Brittany Purl will join our Sixth Form and we are looking forward to helping her pursue her ambitions whilst at the same time developing her wide range of extra-curricular interests.

Simon Gilbert-Barnham, Principal at Ormiston Venture Academy said, "The scholarship process has highlighted the remarkable skills, strengths and qualities our students have in abundance. We are extremely proud of all the candidates and particularly for Brittany. This unique opportunity through our partnership is a life changing opportunity, as proven by previous scholars, and I am certain that Brittany has a bright future ahead. Our partnership with Gresham's stretches far beyond this scholarship and it is fantastic to see another successful outcome for the children."

Gresham's has previously awarded five scholarships to students at Ormiston Venture Academy who have gone on to study for a range of exciting careers.

Fundraising for Comic Relief

This year for Comic Relief the Union of Venture Students decided to combine their fundraising efforts with School in a Bag. School in a Bag is a simple solution created to help poor, orphan, vulnerable and disaster affected children throughout the world. You can purchase a red School Bag for £15.

Each School Bag is filled with stationery equipment and resources that will enable a child to write, draw, colour. calculate, express themselves and above all learn. The Union really like this but also really liked the idea that each bag has a unique code tagged to it so you can track where it goes and look for it in any photos that may come back from work done by the organisation.



Since becoming aware of the School in a Bag organisation through PiXL, the students have really wanted to run a "wear something red day" to fundraise and whilst this was also the main suggestion for fundraising for Comic Relief, having a single day made sense. The Union led assemblies on the importance of the work of Red Nose Day and explained the School in a Bag scheme in the run up to 13th March. They set each PL group a target of raising £30, this would be enough to split the funding equally between Comic Relief and School in a Bag and allow each group to track their own bag. The Performing Arts students also made videos to promote the fundraising efforts.

In addition to the "wear something red" event on Friday 13th March, 120 red noses sold out in just over an hour and the annual academy talent show Venture's Got Talent put all of its profits from ticket sales and refreshments into the fundraising pot as well. Once all of the events had been completed the academy was able to send off £573 to Comic Relief

and School in a Bag



(which would then be doubled by the government) and with the addition of some students and staff wanting to purchase a bag for themselves have been able to order 45 School in a Bag rucksacks. We are now just awaiting delivery of our rucksacks and the guidelines on how they may be customised with additional items and notes/letters so that PL groups can add a personal touch to what they send.

The Union of Venture Students are very proud that they have been able to meet their target of at least one bag for every PL group and still send off a great amount for Comic Relief. They have had an incredible year in terms

of increasing the impact of charity and fundraising events raising in excess of £6000 so far this year, donating a huge amount of food to local foodbanks at Christmas and now are in the process of setting up their own soup kitchen in association with a local community group. The student body has really taken ownership of their philanthropic efforts and moved it to the next level.



National Literacy Trust Pilot

The National Literacy Trust is a national charity dedicated to raising the literacy levels in the UK.

They aim to improve the reading, writing, speaking and listening skills in communities across the UK. Research and analysis completed by the National Literacy Trust make them the leading authority on literacy.

At Ormiston Venture Academy we have been lucky enough to be invited to be involved in a pilot for the National Literacy Trust over the next three years. Within Venture, the pilot will be led by the newly appointed Leader of Excellence in

Literacy, Bethany Wilkinson. The pilot will involve a range of different elements including whole staff training, targeted faculty training, strategies to develop intervention outside the classroom and encourage more students to foster a love of reading.

Work is already underway with an initial review taking place to identify strengths and areas to build upon over the course of the pilot. During the review The National Literacy Trust were impressed by our students and the work already in place across the academy to develop the literacy skills of our students.

They were particularly impressed with the work of the Success Centre noting that this "intervention strategy is impressive".


The 2014-15 board have done an incredible job. Sutton Scholars

Back in February some very gifted Venture students won places on the prestigious University of Cambridge **Sutton Scholars Programme.**

This is a new project being piloted and funded by the University of Cambridge, The Sutton Trust and The Wolfson **UNIVERSITY OF** Foundation.

CAMBRIDGE Sutton Scholars is a

two year programme beginning mid-way through year 9 and finishing during year 11. Based around coastal and rural communities in East Anglia, it's designed for academically able students. The aim is to develop participants' academic interests, stretching them

beyond their studies in school, and to provide them with information and insights into applying to and studying at top universities.

All participating students visited Cambridge University in April to take part in skills workshops and academic taster sessions, met current undergraduate students and spent time exploring the grounds and history of Peterhouse College.

Students had nothing but praise for the visit, commenting in particular on how the visit has made them feel more confident about attending university now they know more about university life in general.

The next visit to Cambridge University takes place at the end of June, during which students will be introduced to the research skills required to tackle the demands of University education, as well as other activities that will develop their academic interests and skills.

During Year 10, the students will be able to explore their own interests by undertaking an academic project which they will finish during a three day residential event at the University.

Published in Redesigning Schools by SSAT

The Union of Venture Students is a relatively new form of student voice that has been running in the academy for around 18 months.

It was formed with the intention of building on existing successful student council systems and increasing both the opportunities for students to take on roles of leadership and responsibility but also for all students to have their voices heard within the academy.

A new structure was set up to ensure that each area of the academy was impacted upon and allowed student participation to increase.

Students had used Harts Ladder of Participation as a source of reference and inspiration and wanted to move to a point where their contribution was decreasingly tokenistic and moving more towards a position where they were co-constructors and decision makers within the academy.

The model has been hugely successful and most importantly student driven. 39% of the current student body are in a role of responsibility within the academy, fundraising efforts have smashed those of previous years, students are driving forward new ideas for roles such as eco team members and transition buddies and are even in the process of forming their own soup kitchen for the community.

They are involved in curriculum design and are about to lead their own CPD sessions on curriculum hacking in the second half of the summer term and they have just finished their first year of having a £4000 budget to spend on academy improvement which has included funding an E-magazine,

The success of the model has led to it being shared on a number of levels. The students themselves have now presented at two conferences, the SSAT Conference in Manchester in December and the Norfolk Secondary Heads Conference in March.

For both of these they skyped in, presented and took of schools, academies and independent schools both

> locally and nationally to develop links, as one of their next targets is to try and increase collaboration on issues that impact on their education and lives with a wider network of schools.

> Their work has also been used as a case study in the SSAT Redesigning Schools series where the aim is to provide a vehicle to widely share and celebrate the innovative work in schools. Redesigning Schooling in Action case studies focus on five core areas: teaching for learning, principled curriculum design, principled assessment design, courageous leadership for professional accountability, the new professionalism.



Miss Smith Completes London Marathon

In early 2014 I took my first steps. Not like a toddler but almost. I ran for the first time guided by a sighted person on the roads around Gorleston.

It felt amazing and I quickly realised that not only was the feeling of being free and my fitness improving, but that my self-confidence and esteem were improving more. One day in a moment of (at the time) complete madness I applied to Guide Dogs UK to see if I could earn a place in the 2015 Virgin London Marathon to run on their behalf.

I was already in debt to the charity for giving my mobility and life back when they provided me with my first dog Vanity. I am now on my 2nd chapter of my life with my next dog and companion Unity. I wanted to help others gain the same freedom and mobility I did from being given a guide dog, especially children who the charity also provides dogs for.

To my surprise and shock I gained a place and was entered in to the London Marathon. I promised that I would raise a minimum of £2500.00 to support the charity, which although would help it, is only is just the start of what the charity needs when you consider it costs over £48,000 to train and support a guide dog in their role from which I have benefited twice.

Now I had the place, the hard work, self-belief and regimented training would begin. Before February 2014 I had never ran in my life before and now I was going to run 26 Miles (the equivalent of running from Gorleston to the centre of Norwich) in the world's most famous marathon.

I joined a local running club, Great Yarmouth Road
Runners and met and trained with a collection of people

who I class as my running family along with my running guides Carl Jessop and Dave Silk. My other family, the students and staff at Ormiston Venture joined me on my journey giving me immense encouragement and support both emotionally and physically.

In September 2014, 8 Venture students joined me at the local Morrison's Supermarket in Gorleston, where we bag packed

community shoppers' grocery's raising a massive £922.30 towards the target I had promised to raise. The students represented the academy in a way that we can all be proud of with staff and shoppers praising them on their maturity, politeness and general social skills. I know that this is the case with all of our students but the 8 students who helped me so much were:
