Venture Academy Gains the Quality in Careers **Mark Award**

Over 60 pieces of evidence collated from across the academy were sent in advance of a rigorous interview process which included 40 students from different year groups.

Students had to speak to the assessor remotely, talking of their ambitions, and how the academy had helped them in their careers education. Students spoke with passion for their future plans and praised the input of Glynis Sinclair, the careers advisor the academy employs from Beacon

The academy has strong partnerships with local businesses and the University of East Anglia in particular which helps to broaden horizons and raise aspirations, while educating students on university life and what is possible.




Assistant Principal Mr McInally and careers coordinator Miss Roper spoke with the Careers Mark assessor extensively and led her through the 5 year careers plan the academy has for its students. The percentage of students sustaining their education or training post-Venture has risen and remained above the national average over the last few years, demonstrating students readiness for the world in which they are entering.

The academy has built strong relationships with the many Further Education (including Greshams school) and apprenticeship providers in the area, offering students a host of pathways they can aim for in their futures.

"Seeing how careers education and guidance permeate through every subject and aspect of academy life has really shone through during this process. Having a nationally recognised award is pleasing and provides that justification of the work our staff do on a daily basis at the academy."


The day finished with performances from former students and a discussion about recording their own music.

Music Gurus

SHARE THEIR SKILLS WITH FELLOW STUDENTS

Students at Ormiston Venture Academy, which is sponsored by Ormiston Academies Trust (OAT), have become 'music gurus' and are helping younger students to learn musical instruments.

The music gurus are a selected group of year 10 students with a real talent in music. They have spent the last two years instructing younger students in music.

The idea was born from the opportunity to participate in the #iwill social action project and has been led by Mrs Hannah Leggett.

The music gurus have planned, designed and set up their own pre-recorded tutorials, teaching other students how to hold and play an instrument during the return from lockdown in a virtual format. The aim is to provide this tuition to every member of the year 7 community by the end of the academic year and cascade their love of music to younger students.

The year 7 students are now able to play basic chords and notes on two different instruments as a result of the music gurus' tuition. They also now have the opportunity to 'loan' an instrument for a half term after their tuition, in order to practise and master the skills they have been introduced to as part of a 'Music Scholarship' programme the gurus have set up.



Mrs Leggett who leads the #iwill project at Venture Academy commented:

"The music guru students have fully committed to a 'new' way of delivering their sessions. Their confidence improved so much teaching younger students in small groups last year; coming back this term and having to learn new skills like recording blogs and clips of them teaching has added another string to their bow! I'm very proud of them all."

On behalf of the local governing body for Ormiston Venture, I would like to welcome everyone back to the academy ready for a happy and successful year ahead.

Determined optimism from everyone involved has meant that the last year has been challenging but so much more productive than could be imagined. Grateful thanks go to all staff, students, parents and friends in the community for this.







These include helping schools to develop more environmental sustainable actions, peer to peer support in light of the recent pandemic, and to increase the enrichment offer for all students.

Charlie has received these through pure grit and determination and although she has had a turbulent year personally has shown hard work and resilience pays off.

Joshua has achieved an incredible set of results including a grade 9 in English and four grade 8's. Joshua has suffered a loss this academic year which was particularly difficult however he has shown an incredible amount of resilience and strength of character to get to where he is today.

During this time Joshua has continued with his love of Karate where he has finally gained his Black belt and along with clearly studying hard he also borrowed a guitar from the music department and taught himself how to play.

This year's Venture Summer School saw over 140 new year 7 students attend a range of sessions over a week of the summer holidays.

Each day students had a range of 6 sessions to choose

Sessions included, Football, Dodgeball, Softball, Ultimate Frisbee, and Tennis. Those who preferred arts and crafts enjoyed Pom Pom making, Mask Making, decorating cards and gift boxes. Rocket making students got to practise their culinary skills by making chocolate oaties, sausage rolls, cups cakes and pizza.





Students at the academy have been receiving anti-bullying training ran by the Diana Award.

Seventeen Year 7 students took part in a virtual antibullying training session and worked together and acquired vital skills to enable them to change attitudes and behaviours by building their skills and confidence to address different situations, both online and off.

The Diana Award's free Anti-Bullying Ambassador Programme, which is available to schools across the UK, sees trainers working with students and other young people to change the attitude surrounding bullying. The programme has a strong peer-to-peer focus, with trainers giving young people the skills and confidence to become Anti-Bullying Ambassadors to tackle bullying in their schools long after the training has finished. The Diana Award's anti-bullying work is recognised as world-class thanks to this sustainable approach.

The Diana Award's Anti-Bullying Campaign involves a number of different projects aimed at reducing bullying in schools. One of their main projects is the Anti-Bullying Ambassadors programme which has trained over 24,000 young people across the UK to lead on anti-bullying campaigns in their schools.

The training looked at bullying in different situations including face-to-face and online. At the end of the training session, Venture students made an action plan of how to approach bullying issues that may arise in their schools and committed to their roles as Anti-**Bullying Ambassadors.**

Following the success of the training, Ormiston Venture Academy plans to run this event yearly to ensure it benefits as many students as possible and that an anti-bullying ethos continues to be embedded into the academy community, as it always has been.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Mr Cooper subscribed to our online training that we offer to make sure that all schools still have access to our training programmes; as a result, 21 year 7's from Ormiston Venture Academies students are now Anti-Bullying Ambassadors.

They were able to build their own bespoke Anti-Bullying Campaign that is youth-led and will make real positive change at their school."

"I found the Diana Award a fun way to learn how to be an anti-bullying ambassador. It was a fun experience that helps you learn about how to help people if they come to you with a problem".








27 budding leaders have received new roles for the new Union of Venture Students 2021.

Miss Leggett, the Music teacher at Venture booked the workshop to give students a different experience of music making as well as careers in the industry.

There are currently 40 students that study BTEC Music in Year 9 and have missed out on music and practical opportunities due to lockdown. Students were split into 4 groups so they were able to use all of the equipment. This included the use of the Pioneer XD-XZ DJ controller, Roland SE02 sequencer and Roland TR8 drum sequencer.

Noise Academy are a company based in Lincolnshire and offer a unique style of music education that focuses on developing skills such as DJ, Music Production and Beatboxing. Students were able to create their own grooves and rhythms using Logic and native instrument machines, as well as the opportunity to mix songs on Pioneer DJ decks, guided by experienced DJ and workshop leader, Joe Townsley.

Joe Townsley, Managing Director of Noise Academy said, "The Year 9 students were great to work with and they picked up the skills really well. It was clear to see that most students were very musically capable and they all made me feel welcome. Hannah and the rest of the team were really accommodating and I thought the music room was a great space to work in."

Miss Leggett said, "It was fantastic to welcome a guest into the school after so many months of restrictions. It was such an amazing opportunity for our Music students to use industry standard equipment and to receive guidance from an expert in that

Ormiston Venture Team Take Their Problem Solving Skills All The Way to OAT Maths Olympics Final!

Ormiston Venture Academy entered a Year 9 OAT Maths Olympics with the team pictured below: Megan Beales, Bethany Cooper, Dominic Dlugosz, Jessie Higgins and Evie Williams.



The event started in lockdown with a set of questions which even Mr Ashman thought were difficult. The team had their first online meeting arranged for 2 days after Mr Ashman had sent the questions, at the meeting the students announced that the questions had already been solved!

The diagram shows two equilateral triangles. The distance from each point of the smaller triangle to the nearest point of the larger triangle is $\sqrt{3}$, as shown.



What is the difference (in cm) between the lengths of the edges of the two triangles?

Solving the first set of questions was impressive, especially when the judges changed one of their answers to match our teams. The second set of questions arrived and we have attached one below for you to try at home!

Again, the team taught themselves the required skills, and solved the questions. This again showed their ability, resilience and confidence, it is also the exact skills employers are looking for, as unsupported they found the skills needed learnt them and then applied them. These mathematics different challenges including a presentation got us into the final.

The final had different challenges a presentation, a speed maths challenge and a construction challenge. The construction challenge was by far a favourite. The materials sent to them were some tubes, elastic bands, paper, Sellotape and a ruler. They had 15 minutes to construct a bridge of a certain length that could support a bag of sugar for a minimum time. The bridge they built, pictured left, was so strong that it is probably still holding up the sugar. Evie ran some earthquake simulations that showed it was not quite earthquake proof but nearly.







Students in Science have continued to do as much practical work as Covid restrictions allowed throughout the year.

Lots of additional sanitising and quarantining of equipment but practical skills are so important that the effort involved in the extra precautions were worth it.

This was tricky at first as everything had to be kept in bubbles, quarantined and sanitised in a variety of different ways - but it then got even trickier when students needed masks as well as goggles (see photo of Che, Ryan and Kaven in masks and goggles).

Year 7 were investigating how shape effects streamlining using wallpaper paste and plasticine models (Ebony and Billy) and year 8 have been investigating acids and alkalis (Jessic, Kyle and Ryan) Ryan Feehan (yr8), shown in the pictures on the right, has been nominated for a Venture Star for Science due to his boundless enthusiasm for the

In other news - the Science Faculty has invested in a 3D printer and are now redesigning and 3D-printing equipment that allows students to work more safely and more efficiently in lessons.

The picture shows a redesigned test tube rack that is more stable and allows observations to be made more easily, a bespoke stand for electrolysis equipment that reduces the risk of it tipping over in the middle of

an investigation, a beaker lid that holds a thermometer upright in the centre of the beaker and a mini quadrat so that ecological sampling can take place whatever the weather. Many other improvements to commercially available equipment are in the design phase and a College Clash competition to design improved science equipment is planned for next academic year.

At Venture we deliver a traditional PE curriculum for all five year groups with all key stage four students completing a Sport Studies qualification, as well as a diverse after school enrichment offer. After a very tough year we have had to postpone lots of Venture Elite clubs and fixtures, however due to staff being creative and offering new sports we have been able to uphold our curriculum for all students with minimal disruption, just a lot of sanitizing! Students have been participating in our summer sports such as Softball, Cricket, Tennis and Rounders across all year groups.

We had the amazing opportunity at Venture to welcome Gold medalist and MBE Sophie Bray through our doors for an exciting afternoon of Hockey on Tuesday 22nd June 2021. During lunchtime all students had the chance to attend a 'meet and greet' event held at the amphitheatre with Sophie Bray and of course even Vinnie made an appearance! Students were asking questions, as well as being able to hold and wear Sophie's' Rio 2016 gold medal - an opportunity our students may never get again in their lifetime. Led by Mr Doggett and assisted by Mr Ives, the college consists of three major subject areas; these are English, Humanities (History, Geography & RE) and Modern Foreign Languages (French & Spanish). Achieve students will therefore always have a member of one of these faculties as a PL Tutor, within one of these classrooms.

During their time at Venture, students study a broad curriculum that prepares students not simply for the rigours of GCSE, but also so that everyone at Venture experiences a broad range of subjects that enables students to be well prepared to contribute as 21st Century, global

Therefore in English, students study Shakespeare, analyse poetry, write creatively and all students are also exposed to both modern and pre 1900s texts. Year 9 students begin the year with our 'Tainted Love' poetry anthology where they learn to compare and analyse poetry, looking closely at a range of poets, before exploring either Orwell's 'Animal Farm' or Adichie's 'Purple Hibiscus', discovering themes of oppression and crucial worldwide history. As we move through the year, students will be given opportunites to speak formally and present their opinions on controversial

In History, students are taught about the development of Britain following the Battle of Hastings through to the reign of Queen Victoria. New topics for 2021 include 'How should the Kingdom of Mali be remembered?' so students get to see how culturally advanced Africa was before slavery, while 'Revolutions' will compare the American and French Revolutions, examining what they wanted liberty from and how they achieved this.

This will also enable students to experience the expectations of GCSE and dip their toes into a more in depth study of an historical topic.

In Geography, students learn about the eco-system and the impact climate change has on rivers and flooding as well as other hazards and the causes and consequences

Our Modern Foreign Languages incorporate French and Spanish; both very popular choices at GCSE. Key topics include the theme of identity and culture, school, the local area, future plans and international global dimension. In year 9, Spanish and French students will look at describing in depth what their hobbies are, and what they do in their free time.

Students will explore work and careers; discussing what they want to do in the future, and the importance of languages for careers.

Trips to the Houses of Parliament for debating competitions and the Globe Theatre are popular annual events.


The English team also always leads the way with our annual World **Book Day celebrations** and runs key events such as the 'poetry slam' when all colleges compete against each other and the annual spellathon, run by students for local primary school students.

The challenge was a 2 hour team challenge where all four in each team were given the same tasks and needed to work together to decipher the differing levels of tasks in the set time. The competition this year was again an Online Challenge due to the Covid Situation.

All 4 of the team enjoyed the experience and had a great time taking part. Unfortunately there were technical issues with the software and therefore the event could not be finished so no winners could be announced.

This year the amazing Mr Ashman has been supporting our students in two exciting Maths opportunities organised by the Maths Master Class and the Maths Trust.

Maths Master Class is a programme of free maths support tutorials for talented students from disadvantaged backgrounds, it has been launched by science and maths author Dr Simon Singh, MBE, a British popular science author, theoretical and particle physicist whose works largely contain a strong mathematical element.

Open to students in Year 8 and Year 11, the programme – Maths Masterclass Tutorials offers year-long maths tutoring online to small groups of students. It is designed to challenge students and stretch them beyond the maths they will be doing at school.

These sessions improve their maths problemsolving, understanding and confidence, and generally increase their enjoyment and commitment to the subject. The hourlong sessions are delivered via Zoom by the most engaging and passionate, highly skilled, experienced tutors.
