## My Childhood Whispers

This is a story that I do not tell often. I promise, sincerely, that this has scarred me for the rest of my life and although I have looked into psychological explanations for what I heard and natural explanations for what I saw and occurred. It still to this day remains a locked away mystery.

When I was a child, I was truly terrified of the dark. I swore to my mother that I heard voices. They were evil, and they were not familiar and so rightly they scared me. It was not uncommon in the middle of the night for me to wake up and hear "whispers" as I would call them when asking my mum. She figured they were just "little bumps in the night" and typical kids nightmare material, but I tried to explain to her that it was more than that, much more. They sounded different from one another the way people's voices do. On some nights I would get so scared from these "whispers" that I would sleep in my mum's bed with her. It was a lucky escape that the bathroom was directly outside of her bedroom door.

I should add at this point that when walking out into the hall to go to the bathroom, you were forced to look directly down the staircase that would lead you into the living room on the ground floor

(as my mum's bedroom was on the first floor). On one such night, around Halloween time, I awoke and felt the need to rush to the toilet. I quickly walked out from my bedroom door and distinctly heard the phrase "Look!" and to my astonishment, a red light, almost like a spotlight, was cast upon the wall at the very bottom of the stairs. The light had no other source, it was by itself, and I myself was transfixed by it.

I DID NOT know what this light was, so I started to pick up my pace after the second step as it began to creep off the wall and fade into the darkness in the living room.

That's when I heard him. A very strong, masculine voice. Different from the first. Not at all like my father's. It said, "Stop! Right now. Get back up the stairs." In a grainy possessed, demon like voice. I listened, and jerked around, and what happened next I am not sure I would believe if someone had told me this same story. After reaching the top of the stairs, I heard a very loud CRASH that sent me running back to my mother's bed where I jumped straight under the covers and stayed there the whole night, terrified.

When we awoke the next morning, the decoration lights (little Halloween pumpkin lights that glowed red) my mother had put on the railing down the stairs were pulled straight down to the bottom of the railings, some lay broken from what seemed like a forceful tear, laying in a single pile.

And the settee flipped onto its side standing straight up barely scraping the ceiling of the living room. My mother could not explain it!

My father was worried that we had been victims of a break in. My sister was pouring her eyes out. There was nothing missing, nobody had broken in, there didn't seem to be any reason why this had happened. And then I saw it, and I kept quiet about it because I was so afraid to the extent that I couldn't even force words out of my mouth and also that the thing which was in the living room that night would come back for me.

There, on the edge of the stained coffee table which had been facing up, were three indentations where the finish on the wood had been worn, almost as if in a forceful grip. Something down there had GRABBED IT AND THREW IT DOWN! That was what the big bang was.

I was mortified. After that night I never heard a single voice again even though I lived there till I was 17. I do not like to imagine what was waiting downstairs for me that night, if it was anything at all, but I can tell you that the reality was that something had physically acted upon those things in the house near the bottom of the stairwell that night.

After this, I had never heard another whisper again. Which is tragic, because in some ways I would have liked to thank the man that had stopped me from going down those stairs that one terrifying night. Remember now this happened when I was 7. I'm now 21 years old, and because of this occurrence I am still tremblingly afraid of the dark. ESPECIALLY shadowy stairwells. And I'm going back to visit my parents next month and I'm worried. Worried about, is this thing going to come back for me?

And most despicably what is it capable of?

**Ormiston Venture Academy in** Gorleston dedicated a whole afternoon (and evening) to careers-based education on Thursday 21st October in order for students to consider their futures in more depth.

Mr McInally – Assistant Principal and careers lead, organised a strategic approach to careers education across the whole academy for the afternoon, where all students in years 7-10 took part in a range of activities focused on their pathways and futures.

Students discovered new and varied jobs, learnt about Further Education, apprenticeships, and Higher Education pathways. Students in years 7 & 8 learnt about career pathways from Mr Gilbert-Barnham (and his journey from Mullumbimby – the biggest small town in Australia, to Gorleston!), salaries of careers and character profiling which can lead to suggested careers.

Students in years 9 & 10 had the opportunity to write application letters for jobs and practice interview skills in their sessions as well. Students saw work experience clips from Stacey Dooley's nine to five series and from the Welsh comedian Rhod Gilbert on Youtube.

Students and their parents / carers had the opportunity to meet with their child's Personalised Learning tutor later in the evening as part of their Academic Review Day process - where their career choices could be explored further on an individual basis.








## Shoebox Appeal 2021

**Students at Ormiston Venture** Academy, have been supporting young people in Eastern Europe and Africa through their annual shoebox appeal.

Following the launch of this year's shoebox appeal, students across the academy have been busily packing items ready to provide some Christmas cheer for those less fortunate. The Samaritans 'Operation Christmas Child' is where shoexboxes full of gifts are created and then delivered to children who need them most, as Christmas presents.

A shoebox gift provides a connection between different cultures, backgrounds and nationalities. It bridges the gap between those who have something to give and those who can't wait to receive it. Students at Venture were told that over one million shoeboxes were sent out from the UK and Ireland again last year, with 5,000 UK volunteers helping to prepare the shoeboxes for delivery in fourteen different countries again in 2021.

With 2020 being such a difficult year for everyone, the Samaritans 'Operation Christmas Child' Appeal was perhaps even more important than ever, with even more young people across the world struggling to provide basic necessities, let alone gifts at Christmas time.

Students, teachers, administration staff and parents packed an impressive 43 shoeboxes that were then delivered to the local drop off point in Norwich. The whole Ormiston Venture

community was delighted to be involved in something so interesting that will bring so much joy to so many young people in parts of the world they may never visit.

With the shoeboxes from last year arriving in Romania for Christmas, everyone at the academy is excited to see which country they will be helping in 2021.

Spencer Doggett, who launched the appeal again this year, said:"Tutors showed a video about the shoebox appeal and it clearly hit home. It makes students realise

that life in Great Britain is perhaps far less difficult than it is in other parts of the world. even after the pandemic. Despite another tough year for our own communities here on the East Coast, we have managed to pull together and hope to better last year's total number of boxes, providing even more young people who our students will never even meet, something to smile about on Christmas Day 2021"





In 1994 Dr Colguhoun, Bill and Sue along with some their wing and groups were formed over the UK to expand this training to anyone who needed it.

In 2000 Bill and Sue had retired and moved to Belton and after a short while started another local training group Heart Start Belton. This coincidentally was the 500th group formed in the UK.

Year 8 and 9 students at Ormiston Venture Academy, have received vital first aid training.

The students took part in the training sessions that were run by Nigel Wildman from the British Red Cross, over a two week period. The intensive training covered the core aspects of first aid, including helping the students to identify which personal qualities they have that are great for helping others in an emergency.

The training included various vital practical sessions, including one on how to deliver CPR and using an Automated External Defibrillator (AED). All of the students were incredibly well engaged and loved being able to be hands on, doing CPR on Resusci-

Anne's and getting to use practice AED's. This gave the students not only the skills but the confidence to use these techniques in a real-world

Following on from the training, the academy plans to offer all their Venture Ambassadors the opportunity to train as First Aid Champions. The training is a certificated online course set up by the British Red Cross that will build on the basic skills the students have already

been given and will further develop their abilities and confidence in first aid.

Providing the students with this vital opportunity has been a fantastic way to support not just those at Venture Academy but will also help to keep the wider community safe. Overall, the training was a great success and has ensured that students are now prepared in the case of an emergency.

Owen Cooper, Head of Student Support at Ormiston Venture Academy, said:

It is so important that everyone has basic first aid training to allow them to have the skills and the confidence to deal with situations in a calm and responsible way. Hopefully, the students will never have to use these skills but if they do, then they will have the key knowledge to be able to save a life."

During the late 1980's in Malvern, Worcestershire where Sue and Bill lived and worked, a Doctor M Colquhoun was investigating how members of the public could be trained in Basic Life Support in an emergency.

ambulance personnel launched Heart Start Malvern to train local groups and organisations in the skills of CPR. With time the British Heart Foundation took this under


After several years the basic life support techniques changed and updated and we stopped our local training as it was now being handed to St John, The Red Cross and Ambulance organisations.

## Year 9 Computer Science Students Visit Bletchley Park Museum

## The Computer Science Department at **Ormiston Venture Academy took 85** year 9 students to Bletchley Park.

We split into 3 groups to do a carousel of activities around the park. These consisted of a guided tour of some of the key exhibits around the 20 acre site. A workshop on codebreaking, using techniques they used during the war, and free time to visit the many exhibitions around the site.

We saw how Bletchley Park, a country estate, was secretly chosen to be a wartime base and how GC&CS began urgently preparing to increase its peacetime workforce of around 150 in order to cope with the huge codebreaking task that was coming to over 6000.

Some of the groups watched an incredible and moving cinematic experience exploring Bletchley Park's secret D-Day role. On 6 June 1944, the largest amphibious landing in history was launched by the Allies. D-Day, codenamed Operation Overlord, saw tens of thousands of Allied troops land along the heavily fortified Normandy coastline.

Students observed the exhibit of Alan Turing, one of the most well-known Codebreakers to have worked at Bletchley Park, For the early part of the war, he was Head of Hut 8, working on decrypting German Naval Enigma messages. In this display, we discovered more about his genius at Bletchley Park, his later work on computing and his ongoing legacy today.

We saw the largest and most comprehensive display of Enigma machines in the world, we saw different models and learnt how this fiendish cipher machine worked. Enigma machines were used to encode messages before and during World War Two.

Owen Cooper, Computer Science Teacher and Trip Organiser said of the trip

"It was an incredible and moving trip, as a Computer Science Department we were obviously mainly interested in the Enigma Machine and how the development of this helped shape computing in the modern world. However, the cross curriculum aspect that linked with History was amazing.

Both the students and the staff that went learnt so much, and also found out some amazing "Secrets" about Bletchley park that not many people will be aware of. This is a trip that we would love to repeat yearly and would like to take the opportunity to thank Bletchley Park for being so accommodatina and also supporting the trip with a bursary."









## Yr10 Photography Trip

On Thursday 16th September, nineteen Year 10 Photography students & three members of staff (Mr Clarke, Miss Cornwell & Mrs Latchford) went on an amazing day trip to Holkham and Sheringham to take natural landscape photographs as part of their GCSE Photography Landscape unit.


as exhibiting their competitive nature in guilds such as beat the cube, football and cricket!
