

Ormiston
Venture Academy
has received the Young Carers
Friendly Tick award, following an
accreditation process that showcased
their dedication to supporting young
carers.

Young Carers created the Friendly Tick Quality Standards in Education to improve awareness and support for young carers and young adult carers. Following a rigorous renewal process by the Norfolk Young Carers Forum, Ormiston Venture was recognised for going above and beyond to support young carers and their families in the community.

Schools have to meet five standards in order to qualify for the award. These standards include: having a named member of staff as a Champion/Lead; consulting with young carers; covering issues relating to young carers/ young adult carers in staff training; displaying information about young carers and projects that support them locally; and raising awareness of young carers with students in assemblies and/or PSHE/tutor time.

Throughout lockdown, the academy worked incredibly hard to support young carers, including weekly calls to parents/carers and the students themselves to ensure they were offering consistent support. The academy applied for and secured several grants to allow young carers and their families to go on a funded holiday over the summer. Additionally, all of the young carers had mental health training from The Children's Society, which provided further support.

Since the lockdown, Ormiston Venture Academy has set up safe spaces for young carers during break and lunchtimes, where they are offered additional help with work. They have also

set up weekly meetings with Great Yarmouth and Gorleston Young Carers and have created a dedicated Twitter account to keep the community up to date with the Venture Carers and Venture Ambassadors and the wonderful work they do.

James, a Year 7 student at Ormiston Venture Academy, said:

"It is so good to be in a group that will help you because if you get stuck on something there are always people there to help"

Abbie-Gail, a Year 10 student at Ormiston Venture Academy, said:

"Before I came to Venture, I didn't realise I was a young carer and I now get help from my academy. They also referred me to extra after-academy activities and groups such as Great Yarmouth and Gorleston Young Carers, so I feel even more supported. As a young carer, it is so important that we are recognised at the academy"



Principal Simon Gilbert-Barnham, said:

Tick award for our academy has
highlighted the need to ensure
we strive to keep supporting our
existing Venture Carers while being
aware of any students that may also
be young carers as we know that
in an academy of 890 students, we
have more than 32 young carers.."

"We know this will be a continuous process but working alongside our local Young Carers group, we can ensure the awareness of our young carers is given an important focus in the academy."

## INTERNET SAFETY

## A visit from Victoria Rush, Norfolk Constabulary's Safer Schools Team.

It was great to have a 'live' presentation following the virtual, pre-recorded messages that the Safer Schools Team provided during the period of lockdown this time last year as students were accessing their learning via online lessons.

Internet Safety is a key part of the CASH curriculum (Community, Aspiration, Spirituality & Health), as not only has the online 'community' become a greater part of all our lives over the last two years, but it is an area that can also affect a student's mental health, especially when things go wrong.

Year 7 students study a module on internet safety in Computer Science and this was followed up on Internet Safety Week, prior to half term, with two further lessons. Year 8 students also received these.

Victoria Rush explained to students the dangers of Social Media and the importance of staying safe and it was great to see that Venture students could give examples of how when she posed them all the question at the beginning; Not giving your full name and address out to people you don't know, not accepting friend requests from strangers and the importance of using the Big Red Button (via our website) to report anything of concern were all given.

The session dealt with two key problems; Online Bullying and Sexting. Students were told what cyber bullying is and the consequences for bullies and their victims. It highlighted that bullying behaviour can be a criminal offence and to strategies to help students make better choices about what they post on the internet.

The sexting element of the presentation (making, sharing, sending or receiving explicit images or comments online) aimed to give students a better understanding of what sexting is, the consequences of this and what they can do if they, or someone

else is affected by sexting. The session involved an activity in which students are given a number of 'sexting scenarios', including watching an animated video that showed the pitfalls of sending someone an image you later regret. Students were also sign posted to a number of people and places to go for help.

The Computer Science Department at Ormiston Venture Academy took 38 students (35 Year 10 and 3 Year 9) to The Centre of Computing History in Cambridge.

We divided the students into 3 groups to partake in 3 activities throughout the day. These included a demonstration and lesson on the world's largest processor. Here students would consolidate and build on their knowledge of the CPU architecture. There was a programming session using Raspberry Pi and Python to program robots and a guided tour of the museum learning the history of the computer, adding vital context to

students' existing knowledge. Our students were also able to spend time between sessions trying the extensive collection of retro games consoles.

The Centre presents a unique collection of artefacts with particular emphasis on the rise of personal computing from the huge machines of the sixties to the impact on us all today. Discrete displays in the main gallery present the technology through themes such as; the sixties, military machines, connected world, games, business machines, calculators and much more.

Our students were able to get up close and personal to these artefacts and see where we have come from and the vast improvements which have been made. Students were particularly impressed with how drastically secondary storage has developed in both capacity and physical size.

The megaprocessor was particularly interesting, as it allowed our students to see the Fetch Decode Execute cycle in action. It was created By James Newman between 2014-2016 and holds the Guinness World

Record for the largest processor. "Computers are quite opaque, looking at them it's impossible to see how they work.

What I would like to do is get inside and see what's going on. Trouble

is we can't shrink down small enough to walk inside a silicon chip. But we can go the other way; we can build the thing big enough that we can walk inside it. Not only that we can also put LEDs on everything so we can actually SEE the data moving and the logic happening. It's going to be great"- James Newman.

> Students also completed a workshop in the 80's style classroom. This was Pi Power and used Raspberry Pi and Python to control external objects. This was a really strong activity for our students given their experiences using Python so far. This allowed them to see how it can be applied in different scenarios to solve

Head of Computer Science and Trip leader, Lewis Riches said

"The Visit to The Centre of Computing History embeds itself perfectly into our curriculum adding vital contextual information to support students existing knowledge. It is a place which we have enjoyed visiting in the past and plan to continue in the future for other groups of students. All students had a fantastic time and thoroughly enjoyed the experience! "Students were enthused throughout

the day and asked plenty of questions. All were a credit to the academy.

Under-18 Norwich City Football Club scholars Osman Foyo and Finley Welch attended Ormiston Venture Academy to meet and work with year 8 students on the Premier League Inspires Programme.

The players took questions from the group regarding becoming footballers, their influences and their lifestyle at the moment before working specifically with small groups on their projects.

Osman commented that if his school was more like Venture, maybe he would have behaved better when he was younger!





Finley was blown away by the maturity of the students he met and seemed really impressed with their designs for new NCFC branded drinking cups.

Students at Venture have been working with Aoife Linehan who is the PL inspires officer on character building initiatives and with the students selected for a separate challenge on branding and marketing. These students will soon have the chance to pitch their idea to Premier League representatives in the director's box at the NCFC stadium Carrow Road.

# Paul Hannaford... Came to Venture to talk with every year group across the academy.

His 45 minute workshop fits within our CASH framework of Community, Aspiration, Spirituality and Health and his life story actually touches on all of these.

Over the past 10 years Paul has built a successful career educating over 400,000 school children from multiple year groups ranging from Year 4 up to sixth form, tailoring the message appropriate to their ages. His talk focused on the dangers of addiction, drugs and alcohol as well as involvement in gangs, knife crime and county lines.

Through his own experiences as a former addict of over 20 years, he conveyed an incredibly powerful message, showing us all that making the right decisions at the wrong times is crucial to achieving your goals and aspirations.

He told his life story about how he began making poor decisions around eleven years old, how his life and dream potential career as a footballer came to an abrupt end. His life quickly spiralled out of control, leading to visits to court, hospital and ultimately prison on numerous occasions.

Paul's workshop with each year group ended with a question and answer session.

Paul says,

"I believe passionately that every child matters, and that their future should be a bright one," and his goal of reaching 1 million students across the UK is almost half way there.

The group then learnt the importance of decision


making skills - with Premier League Inspires officer Aoife Linehan, and had a chance to become the NCFC first team manager to select a team for the next match with a budget in mind!


The Baraza was a huge success and will be scheduled again for the summer term to build on suggestions and priorities for the Union of Venture Students.


















# Sports News Round Up
