

CASH Week


Like CASH lessons on Wednesday afternoons with PL Tutors, it is a whole week when we investigate and ask and answer interesting questions, get involved in debates and discuss ideas. Our Venture values include; 'Enable students to be well prepared to respect others as 21st Century global citizens in Britain and beyond.' This is the mantra for CASH week and stitches the activities, visitors and experiences together.

The three year groups each had a theme for the week;

Year 7-Identity Year 8-Justice

Year 9-Relationships

Year 7 focused on the theme of identity and this included looking into Christianity, how we treat others-including a session named 'Bullying or Banter?', democracy, British Values and also included a 'Create Day', where students worked with one member of the Create faculty and baked, composed music, painted, made items in textiles and explored photographic techniques.



Year 8 focussed on justice. This include sessions of poverty, crime and drugs & alcohol. Year 8 also explored aspects of Christianity and had their own Create Day. Visitors included the Matthew Project who presented workshops throughout the day on the dangers of drugs and alcohol.



Year 9 focussed on relationships. 




Friday the 16th of June marked an important milestone for a group of Year 10 students as they embarked on their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award **Expedition.**

This highly anticipated adventure would prove to be a transformative experience, allowing the students to develop crucial life skills,

foster independence, and cultivate resilience. Accompanied by dedicated staff members, the students set out on a challenging two-day journey that would test their physical and mental limits.

Ei-Coe, Joe, and Joshua, assembled at Venture early in the morning on Friday, eager and ready to tackle the adventure that lay ahead. Three staff members, Gemma, Will, and Agnes, provided guidance and support throughout the expedition. With their 65-litre backpacks packed and spirits high, the students bid farewell to their familiar surroundings and set off into the unknown.

Their destination was the picturesque area of Baconsthorpe, a place known for its scenic beauty and diverse terrain. The students would spend a minimum of six hours hiking each day, allowing them to immerse themselves in the natural splendour of the surroundings. The first day alone saw them conquer an impressive 43,665 steps, equivalent to approximately 9 miles, while the second day covered another 29,040 steps.. This physical feat showcased their determination and perseverance in the face of challenges.

Divided into two groups, with six students in each, the young adventurers worked together to fulfil a team goal or aim. These aims, set as part of the 20 expedition conditions, required them to pool their resources, communicate effectively, and collaborate to overcome obstacles. This aspect of the expedition emphasised the value of teamwork and problem-solving, skills that are essential for success in various career aspects of life.

Carrying everything they needed in their backpacks. the students faced additional challenges posed by the scorching weather. However, they persevered, demonstrating their resilience and commitment to completing the expedition.

It is important to note that while the students had







As the project came to a close, the students emerged with a deeper understanding




Our trainee teachers celebrated recently as they each received their certificates at their graduation ceremony, and we couldn't be prouder of their achievements.






Beyond the classroom, MFL offers inter-school debating competitions and you may spot students proudly adorning 'master linguist' badges, attained in either subject for excellence in examinations or extended learning. Trips to Disneyland Paris, Belgium and Madrid have been organised for the coming year and are sure to further enhance the reputation of this burgeoning area of the academy.

Within the Humanities faculty, History students are taught about the development of Britain following the Battle of Hastings through to colonialism under the reign of Queen Victoria, while international topics are explored such as apartheid in South Africa and the French and Russian Revolutions.

In Geography, students learn about the eco-system and the impact climate change has on rivers and flooding as well as other hazards and the causes and consequences of population growth all over the planet. Local fieldwork on our coast, as well as trips to Poland and the First World War trenches are always well received. Finally, Religious Education has been a popular addition to our CASH curriculum, but from 2023-24, RE will be taught as part of a well-rounded Humanities offer in Year 7-9.









Aspire

Within Aspire, we have Maths and Computer Science. Seeing students challenged and supported in topics and allowing them to strive and succeed in our welldeveloped curriculum is part of the day-to-day routine.


We cover topics in number, algebra, geometry and statistics, giving all pupils the opportunity to become mathematicians. This year has seen amazing work in the maths classrooms, but also success beyond - with students coming second in the national OAT Maths Challenges!

Pupils enjoy a variety of Maths speakers and trips, including a trip to Norwich Castle, Storming the Castle! Computer Science is an incredibly popular subject at Venture. It sees student develop skills are becoming increasing relevant within the technological world.

As well as learning about E-Safety, hardware and software, the programming skills pupils learn readies them for technical jobs that don't yet exist. They also had an amazing visit to Bletchley Park discovering the wonders of the enigma machine and more!


















Led by Assistant Principal Mr McInally and College leader Mrs Vincent, the Create College is made up of a team of highly dedicated and enthusiastic staff and students.

The Create subjects include Art, Catering, Music, Performing Arts, Photography and Textiles. Best practice and expertise is shared on a daily basis, within the faculty, but also outside of the Academy through Ormiston Academy Trust links.

The Create College is one of the most enjoyable places to be for staff and students. It operates a broad and balanced curriculum for students in Key Stage 3, with an option of further development in year 9, studying favourite subjects in more depth.

Key Stage 4 offers GCSE and BTEC qualifications and is hugely popular. An incredible number of students go on to study at least 1 Create subject from year 10, and many leave with aspirations of further study in this area after achieving some exceptionally high results.

Students go on to study these subjects in more depth in Colleges and Sixth Forms. Apprenticeships in engineering and scholarships at Greshams are also available. We have had success with Callum Cooke then going on to study Fine Art at Oxford University and Daisy Abbots-Freeman dancing in Colchester College for example.

The extra-curricular opportunities within the Create College dominate the Academy's provision. Clubs and activities such as Musical rehearsals, choir and orchestra (Venture Vivace), photography skills and street dance amongst others, complement sessions based on improving qualification grades. Peri lessons enhance musical talent, and we are very grateful for the team of staff who come into the Academy for this.

Creative guilds such as film special FX make up, dress making, crochet, pom pom making, band skills, photography and textiles experimentation also contribute to the programme, and are often massively oversubscribed!!

Showcase events such as the bi-annual musical sell out audiences and the Create show is a representation of the fine work produced by students in Create. The show includes incredible Art and Photography exhibitions, phenomenal Craft and Textiles products, spine tingling musical entertainment, singing and performances as well as a breathtaking fashion show demonstrating the high quality pieces of clothing made in Textiles.

The College is prominent in the local community attending carol services, lantern parades and performing at the Hippodrome concert. The Performing Arts students also performed in the recent Ormiston Academies Trust annual talent showcase.

Guest artists, graphical designers, animators, photographers, chefs, singers and dancers have graced our College and many trips to exhibitions and the West End theatre companies have occurred, broadening horizons and showing students the fruits of what can be achieved in this area.

Mrs Vincent, College Leader commented on how amazing the young people are and that is down to the talented and committed staff we have".

Innovate college is led by Assistant Principal Mr Waters and College leader Miss Teasdel, students in Science have had a fantastic opportunity to complete practical experiments and engage in the awe and wonder that is science knowledge.

Practical skills are so important, and it creates the love of learning that our students so often talk about. For example in Year 7 we are investigating how shape effects streamlining using wallpaper paste and plasticine models and year 8 have been investigating acids and alkalis. In year 9,10 and 11 students have been completing rotations of science subjects benefiting from subject specialist teaching, enhancing every opportunity in the science curriculum.

The Science Faculty has invested in a 3D printer and are now redesigning and 3D-printing equipment that allows students to work more safely and more efficiently in lessons. Redesigning test tube rack that is more stable and allows observations to be made more easily, a bespoke stand for electrolysis equipment that reduces the risk of it tipping over in the middle of an investigation, a beaker lid that holds a thermometer upright in the centre of the beaker and a mini quadrat so that ecological sampling can take place whatever the weather. Many other improvements to commercially available equipment are in the design phase and a College Clash competition and enrichment clubs to design improved science equipment are

offered on a weekly basis. .lnovate

P.E (Physical Education)

The students at Ormiston Venture academy complete six sports across each year with fitness built in throughout each sport.

The students complete these sports as it is a progression from primary school building on prior knowledge, it also links into the academy fixture cycle in the local area to give all students the opportunity to excel beyond the classroom creating links with local sports clubs.

In years 7 & 8 and 9, students focus on learning the fundamental key skills and knowledge in a variety of team and individual sports referenced in the national curriculum. In Year 10 & 11 students opt into three bespoke sport pathways. These are OCR Cambridge National Sport Studies qualification, Leadership award achieving the UK Sport Leaders Level 1 and Level 2 award, and Health and Fitness, achieving a gym instructors qualification on completion of the course.

The students complete the OCR Cambridge Nationals Sport Studies qualification because it develops their understanding of a range of sports which can lead to increased participation rates, enjoyment and wellbeing whilst with us and post 16.

Within this the students complete a compulsory exam unit, leadership unit which permeates through the curriculum from year 7. Leadership in sport is linked to our curriculum intent promoting

the skills and qualities the students will need to become rounded good citizens.

As this is a priority to us at Venture focusing on ambition and the qualities students will need some students will be completing a sports leadership qualification route.

Health and Fitness will be taught to raise students knowledge on how to eat healthily and how to train to improve their fitness for a variety of sports.
