





This is why every December we hold a Christmas jumper day, where students are asked to donate an item of food to the local food bank, rather than pay the usual £1 fee that is distributed to charity. Around 1000 items were donated again, showing the generosity of Venture students and their families. Reverend Matthew Price from the St. Mary Magdalen church received the donations for the local foodbank on the final Monday of term.

Reverend Matthew said, "The foodbank has been seeing increasing demand in recent months, so we are so grateful to Venture."

Mr Doggett, commented,

"Christmas is a wonderful time of year, but we are all aware that people are struggling and food banks are seeing more and more demand; students were all shown a video on the Cost of Living Crisis, which showed many families working fulltime, yet still needing to access foodbanks from time to time. Our students have once again responded so positively to the annual appeal and we are pleased we can make a difference to the local community, in which Venture and the St Mary Magdalen church are the very hub of."



Shoebox Appeal Students had already been thinking about this for several weeks.

Following the launch of this year's Shoebox Appeal in collectives, Personalised learning groups and their tutors had been busily packing items ready to provide some Christmas cheer for less fortunate young people in Eastern Europe, Africa and as far away as Haiti.

The Samaritans 'Operation Christmas Child' is where shoe boxes full of gifts are created and then delivered to countries with children living in poverty as a Christmas present. These will often be the only gifts they will receive. A shoebox gift provides a connection

> between different cultures, backgrounds and nationalities. It bridges the gap between someone who has something to give, and someone who can't wait to receive it.

> > Over one million shoeboxes sent out from the UK and Ireland last vear. 5.000 UK volunteers help to prepare the shoeboxes for delivery and fourteen different countries will receive these valued gifts in 2023.

Exactly 41 shoeboxes were packed jointly by the four colleges and were delivered to the local drop off point in Blofield. Students were delighted to be involved in something so interesting that will bring so much joy to so many young people in parts of the world they may never visit.

Mr Doggett, stated, "It is great to see so many students and staff involved in this each year. We build on it annually and students are keen to help those less fortunate than themselves. Parents have also been very helpful again, purchasing gifts and donating items to go into the shoeboxes. We beat last year's total number of boxes, so the academy is delighted."

UVS Baraza

Just before the Christmas break, Venture's Union of Venture Students (UVS) held its second Baraza of the academic year.

The Baraza, named after an East African tradition, where villagers would hold a regular public meeting asking for change, has been responsible for genuine shifts from the students in our academy community.

Director of Personal Development and lead staff member of the UVS Spencer Doggett commented,

"It is like Venture's own parliament, offering opportunities for the PL Captains across the academy to voice their ideas and even vote upon suggestions other members make; just like a national parliament does." 82 students were in attendance; our largest gathering of the UVS to date.

The December event offered the opportunity to say goodbye to the outgoing UVS members from Year 11 and introduce the new team, who were announced just the day before. Order of business included;

Finally, telling the students about the Active Transport Ambassadors initiative, where UVS members could receive a £5000 grant to make travelling to the academy more sustainable and eco-friendly.

Venture is exceptionally proud of our student union; the Union of Venture Students (UVS).

Since its conception, it has been responsible for genuine change from the students themselves and provided opportunities for real leadership from Year 7 upwards.

Year 10 students have the opportunity to apply for the Senior UVS positions of Head Boy, Head Girl, Deputy Head Boy and Girl and two Head Prefect positions. These are the pinnacle of a successful group of student leaders, working hard as a team to make their academy even better.

A Day of Artistic
Exploration: Year 10
Students Visit London's
Renowned Galleries

In an inspiring journey through history and creativity, Year 10 art students embarked on a captivating excursion to the heart of London's artistic treasures.

Their day began with a visit to the prestigious National Portrait Gallery and the iconic National Gallery, followed by a scenic route past Buckingham Palace, the Houses of Parliament, and along the picturesque River Thames.

The primary objective of this enriching trip was to immerse students in the masterpieces of renowned artists like Van Gogh, Lucian Freud, Pablo Picasso, Turner, Matisse, Monet and Tracey Emin.

The students were not only exposed to the brilliance of these artists but also had the opportunity to delve into the depths of history and culture through their creations. The range of artworks on display, spanning from the Tudors to the Renaissance, provided a comprehensive overview of art evolution over centuries.

Tom in year 10, shared his experience, expressing his fascination with the historical paintings of the royal family. "I really enjoyed our trip to London. I loved looking at the paintings of the royal family from hundreds of years ago.

It gave me real insight into our history through paintings. My favourite piece was a huge painting of the racehorse Whistlejacket, painted by George Stubbs in 1762." Tom's sentiments captured the essence of the trip, highlighting the ability of art to bridge the gap between the past and the present.





Mrs. Mallory, the dedicated teacher of art, emphasized the significance of the excursion.

"We were extremely fortunate to visit the National Gallery and The National Portrait Gallery to view some important pieces of art. The students were so impressed to see original works by Pablo Picasso and Vincent Van Gogh. They really enjoyed the more contemporary works in the National Portrait Gallery and were really inspired by the exhibition Women in Portraiture."

This display not only celebrated the talent of modern artists but also served as a testament to the diverse narratives that art can convey. Through this exhibition, students were able to witness the evolution of portraiture, gaining insights into the changing perceptions of identity and gender over time.

Overall, the day was a remarkable journey for the Year 10 art students, filled with awe-inspiring moments and valuable lessons.

Their visit to London's renowned galleries not only expanded their artistic horizons but also deepened their understanding of history, culture, and the power of creative expression.

As they returned to their classrooms, they carried with them a newfound appreciation for the rich tapestry of human creativity, ready to infuse their own artworks with the wisdom gained from this unforgettable experience.



The Computer Science Department at Ormiston Venture Academy took 40 Year 10 and 5 year 9 students to The Centre of Computing History in Cambridge.

Students were divided into three groups to participate in 4 different activities throughout the day. One session included a lesson on the world's largest processor. This allowed students to consolidate their knowledge and understanding of the FDE cycle, which has just been covered in the curriculum.

This session was particularly interesting, as it allowed our students to see the Fetch Decode Execute cycle in action. It was created By James Newman between 2014-2016 and holds the Guinness World Record for the largest processor. "Computers are quite opaque, looking at them it's impossible to see how they work.

What I would like to do is get inside and see what's going on. Trouble is we can't shrink down small enough to walk inside a silicon chip. But we can go the other way; we can build the thing big enough that we can walk inside it.

Not only that we can also put LEDs on everything so we can see the data moving and the logic happening. It's going to be great"- James Newman.

They were also introduced to early memory and shown how technology has reduced in size and cost but increased in capabilities.

Another session included a programming lesson, controlling external objects. This was called Pi Power and took place in the 80's style classroom. This was an opportunity for students to show off their programming skills to make a remote-controlled buggy to be programmed and move based on inputs from the code.

The third guided session was a tour around the amazing artefacts the museum as curated. This allowed the students to add some vital contextual information to the knowledge they have gained in the classroom. Specifically seeing how computers have developed over

Students were shocked by how large old machines and technology were and I believe this has given them a new appreciation for the devices we use every day.



Students also had the opportunity to explore the games zone, where they were able to play a timeline of game evolution, playing original versions of favourites such as Tetris, Pacman, Sonic and Street Fighter.

Head of Computer Science and Trip leader, Lewis Riches said "The Visit to The Centre of Computing History embeds itself perfectly into our curriculum adding vital contextual information to support students existing knowledge.

It is a place which we have enjoyed visiting in the past and plan to continue in the future for other groups of students. All students had a fantastic time and thoroughly enjoyed the experience! ",

Students were amazing on the day and were enthusiastic in the sessions, asking questions and showing genuine interest into the subject of computing. This was really lovely to see.

Students taught how to save lives

As part of our CASH Curriculum (Community, Ambition, Spirituality and Health), students study a unit on Basic First Aid.



This includes lessons on how to help someone having an asthma attack, how to aid someone who has an allergic reaction and what to do if someone has a head injury. However, the National Curriculum also includes the need to train students in CPR and the use of a defibrillator for emergency situations.

Ormiston Venture is very proud to have trained approximately

600 students since 2021 and is very grateful to the British Red Cross who have once again given their valuable time to train the latest batch of budding First Aiders in Year 8. The Red Cross Community Education outreach programme has provided superb training sessions for all students in Year 8, but in 2021 they kindly agreed to also train Year 9 students, who had their training postponed due to the Covid-19 national lockdown.

This October, trainer Nigel and his team of 'Little Annie' resuscitation dolls delivered workshops over three days to 180 students. This included how to place someone in the recovery position, what to do in an emergency, when and how to give chest compressions and how to use a defibrillator to restart a heart. As it was national 'Restart a Heart' week in the UK on 16th October, so it was the perfect time.

Year 8 Max said,


"It is really useful to know the basic First Aid facts, because it could help save a life one day,"

Kobi said,

"It helped me to know how to do chest compressions properly."

Tamish said,

"CPR is so valuable, because it gives you the knowledge to save a life and prevents someone not knowing what to do in an emergency."



Mr Doggett, Director of Personal Development commented,

"It is great to see the Year 8 students having this training. It was awful to hear that over 6000 people every year in the UK lose their lives because they choke by simply not being placed in the recovery position. This 60 minute training provides skills for life and literally could save a life of a loved one or even a stranger.

The yellow defibrillator machines can look daunting, but when you hear the machine talking to you and telling you what to do at each step, it takes the fear away and makes students more confident."







Joanna Brown (right) visited Venture on behalf of 'West End in Schools' to conduct a theatrical workshop that was centred around Romeo and Juliet.

This gave the students the opportunity to revisit the text and engage with it in a completely different and unique way. Joanna is an actor who has been performing for almost a decade; she is currently performing in 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'; and is very familiar with all things Shakespeare.

"It was so exciting to see the students engaging with Shakespeare in such a dynamic, vibrant way. Students were given the chance to really think about the staging and dramatic production of the play."

Poppy, Year 10 student said

"It was amazing to have such an exciting opportunity to explore Romeo and Juliet from a different perspective - we got to move about and enjoy trialling out parts of the performance!"

150 students from Year 10 and Year 11 took part in a workshop that covered the following:

- Exploring the use of punctuation through movement, discovering how punctuation affects the rhythm, delivery and meaning of the lines.
- Engaging with the impact words of an extract, considering which parts of a line motivate a character to act in the way they do.
- · Working together, using rehearsal techniques to identify key words and their impact on character and plot development.
 - Examining the dynamics between multiple characters within a scene. Students explored staging techniques that can express status, relationships and dramatic tension.

Exploring Textile Structures: A Day at the Time and Tide Museum

A recent excursion to the Time and Tide Museum in Great Yarmouth proved to be an enriching and inspiring experience for Year 10 and Year 11 GCSE Textiles students.

The purpose of this textile-focused trip was to gather primary research, including photographs and sketches, for their 'Structures' themed coursework project. This educational adventure not only fulfilled its academic objectives but also left an indelible mark on the students' creative minds.

The main attraction of our visit was the 'Bare Bones' exhibition, a showcase that perfectly aligned with our coursework theme. However, we couldn't resist the opportunity to explore the entire museum, which housed a treasure trove of maritime history and local heritage. Miss Palmer, the Teacher of Textiles who organised the trip, was effusive in her praise of the museum, stating, "The Time and Tide Museum is a

lovely place to visit, and the Bare Bones exhibition was fascinating." Her enthusiasm was certainly echoed by every student on the trip, as they unanimously expressed their enjoyment.

It is important though that our students are aware of other scholarship opportunities available to them if this is something that is of interest to them and we have made sure this is something that is shared with them throughout year 10 and 11.

This year we are really pleased to say that a number of students have applied for these opportunities at schools across the region, and are incredibly proud of two of those students who have gained full scholarships/bursaries to prestigious schools where they will take up their post 16 studies.

Emiliya is this year's winner of the Ormiston Academy Trust (OAT) scholarship, which will enable her to take up a place at Oundle School, an independent boarding school in Oundle, following an ongoing partnership between the two well-respected education providers.


The OAT scholarship is open to any students in Year 11 at an OAT academy and is available thanks to the generosity of Oundle School.

Emiliya went through a series of tough selection interviews before becoming one of a very small number of shortlisted Ormiston students, drawn from across the country, to attend an interview and selection weekend at Oundle School.

Getting to this final stage is an achievement to be proud of in its own right, however, Emilya was then offered a fully funded boarding place at the school and has accepted the place as an academic scholar to study History, Maths, Economics and Government and Politics with the dream of going into corporate law.

Emilya said "In some ways it hasn't really sunk in yet that out of all the students across Ormiston Academies Trust in the country that I was able to be successful in gaining the scholarship place. I am extremely proud but also extremely grateful to Ormiston Academies Trust and Oundle for providing this opportunity which I intend to take full advantage of in further developing as a person and in helping me achieve my dreams."

Emiliya wasn't the only Venture student to make the final of the OAT Oundle Scholarship, Anneka also made the final interview and selection panel and was already also looking into other options for her study next year that would help her achieve her dream of becoming

validation that they believe in me and what I am capable of and can't wait to continue my studies at Norwich School next year. It has made all the hard work that I have had to put in through some difficulty circumstances really worth it!"

All the staff at Ormiston Venture academy are incredibly proud of both Emiliya and Anneka for these wonderful achievements.

Following the end of Covid restrictions, in 2022 we unofficially broke the World Record for the number of times a balloon could be bounced on a cotton bud in just 30 seconds and in September 2023 set an unofficial cricket World Record by holding the largest ever cricket lesson the world had ever seen; 900 students broke the previous one set in May 2022 at Edgbaston Cricket Ground, that had 645 students taking part in a series of activities and training drills.

With the January weather far less predictable and the temperature much cooler, an indoor record was sought for the Team Building session on our January Student Training day. That was when Mr. Doggett stumbled across a video of a school in Belgium simultaneously playing paper cups to a beat.

Their performance was based on a scene from the movie Pitch Perfect and the challenge was on!

Students watched the Belgian school at work, before also being shown the clip from the movie. They then had a tutorial of how to play to the beat (shown several times) and finally, the entire academy had our very own simultaneous performance across 40 classrooms.

Michael (Year 7) said,

"I really enjoyed it. We didn't always stay in time to the beat for the full 60 seconds, but it was fun."

Director of Personal Development, Spencer Doggett commented,

"It is always good to see our students working as one big team and having fun at the same time. Attempting to beat such a record takes co-ordination and planning, but the students were game and tried their best. We involved just under 900 students today, so smashed the official World Record that stands at 349."

Combined Cadet Force Opportunity

The Combined Cadet Force (CCF) at East Norfolk Sixth Form College (EN6th) works in conjunction with Venture and offers students in Year 9 and above a unique opportunity to engage in a structured and challenging programme designed for their personal development.

Adhering to health and safety guidelines, students can join the CCF, starting from Year 9 and continue through Year 11, and even up to Year 13 with East Norfolk Sixth Form.

To join, interested students need to meet with the coordinator at Venture, Mr Sutton who will provide a consent letter to be signed by parents. After attending initial sessions, those committed to continuing will be equipped with uniforms, provided at no cost, with the exception of boots which students are required to supply.

The CCF operates during term time, with sessions held once a week on Thursdays from 15:30 to 17:30 at East Norfolk Sixth Form College. Those wishing to join need to be committed to regular attendance.

The curriculum, formulated by the Ministry of Defence, covers a wide array of skills, including basic drill, navigation, physical exercise, field craft, first aid, and weapons handling. Beyond the regular monthly

meetings, students can participate in various exercises and training camps throughout the year. Ranging from two days to a week, these activities often involve overnight camping and field exercises, offering an additional dimension to the cadet experience.

Participation in these exercises is not compulsory, but highly encouraged, providing cadets with a chance to apply and enhance their skills in real-world scenarios. Additionally, the CCF offers opportunities for cadets

to progress in rank and take on leadership roles as cadet instructors. Those who attain this status play a crucial role in training newer cadets, planning and delivering sessions to contribute to the overall development of the CCF community.

So far this term the CCF has been involved in the Remembrance Day parade in Gorleston and has undertaken a visit to RAF Marham.

The CCF spent a number of weeks practising their drill and marching to take place in the Gorleston parade (a lot of it in some very nasty weather).

The trip to RAF Marham was a great success with the cadets getting a guided tour of the base and its associated museum. They got to meet an RAF police dog and see a number of the aircraft being readied for flight. They then participated in a number of STEM based team building activities.

Additionally, this term cadets have been undertaking lessons on navigation and map reading skills to prepare them for field exercises in the summer.
