We have a commitment to high quality, evidenceinformed teacher education and we are on a mission to improve the quality of teacher development across the system.

Why train with us?

Our initial teacher training (ITT) programme, in partnership with the National Institute of Teaching (NIoT), is a fully immersive school-centred programme – aspiring teachers will be in the classroom from the very start. Our future teachers will learn from established experts, including teachers, teacher educators, and specialists in teacher professional development, all of whom are authorities in their fields.

Union of Venture Students Venture's Union of Venture Students (UVS) hosted its final Baraza of the calendar year, marking a pivotal moment for student-led initiatives within the academy.

Concludes 2024 with a Landmark Baraza

Rooted in the East African tradition of public forums, the Baraza serves as a platform for students to discuss and enact meaningful change. Director of Personal Development, Spencer Doggett, praised the event as "the British Value of democracy in action," highlighting its role in empowering student leaders to vote on proposals—mirroring the processes of a national parliament. This December Baraza set a new record with 231 students in attendance, the highest turnout for UVS to date.

The event provided an opportunity to recognize and celebrate the contributions of the outgoing Year 11 UVS team while looking forward to the selection of a new Year 10 team through a rigorous interview process later this term. Key achievements were applauded, including the café menu updates, successful fundraising initiatives, international food celebrations, and the work of newly appointed prefects.

Highlights from the Agenda

Progress Updates:

Students reviewed accomplishments since the previous Baraza, including support for local charities. A total of £750 has been raised so far, benefiting Comic Relief, the James Paget Hospital, and Headway, a charity dedicated to supporting individuals with brain injuries.

Eco Project:

The ongoing 'Cut Your Carbon' campaign was revisited, with students reminded of the online collective created by Eco Ambassadors earlier this month.

New Menu Feedback:

Students had the chance to sample potential additions to the Spring café menu, including cherry bakewell

sponge with custard, providing feedback to help refine the offerings.

Future Opportunities:

Several new initiatives were introduced:

- Collaboration with the Youth Advisory Board (YAB).
- Participation in a Youth Council project led by East Norfolk Sixth Form College, where nine students expressed interest in attending six local meetings.
- Expansion of the Boys Mental Wellbeing (BMW) group, with plans for student-led promotion after the holiday break during Tuesday and Thursday breaks.

World Record Attempt:

Students enthusiastically debated the next World Record Attempt, scheduled for the January Student Training Day teambuilding session. After watching clips of potential challenges, they voted to attempt the teabag throwing record, currently set at seven teabags thrown into cups from over a metre away.

Creative Contributions:

The Baraza concluded with discussions about upcoming College Clash events and rewards, with students submitting new ideas for Mr. Waters to explore further.

The December Baraza encapsulated the spirit of collaboration, innovation, and student empowerment that the UVS strives to foster. As the year draws to a close, Venture Academy looks forward to seeing these initiatives come to life under the guidance of the next cohort of student leaders.

The first Baraza of the 2024-25 academic year was held in October, bringing together an impressive 231 student leaders who have taken on new roles within the academy.

These roles include prefects, PL Captains, Wellbeing Ambassadors, Virtues Ambassadors, Eco Ambassadors, sports captains, and the senior Year 11 UVS representatives.

The Baraza, inspired by an East African tradition where communities come together for public meetings to discuss and inspire change, has been a powerful platform for student-led initiatives at the academy. Spencer Doggett, Director of Personal Development and lead staff member of the UVS, highlighted its significance, saying, "Baraza is Venture's democratic space, providing opportunities for student leaders across the academy to voice their ideas and even vote on suggestions, just like a national parliament."



This first Baraza of the year offered a chance to celebrate the UVS's achievements since September. Among the items on the agenda were acknowledging their efforts in marking national food days on the café menu, selecting four local charities to support throughout the year, and brainstorming new ideas for the College Clash.

The event demonstrated the ongoing commitment of the academy's student leaders to fostering positive change and building a stronger school community.

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Year 11 Students Visit Van Gogh's "Poets & Lovers" Exhibition for

GCSE Inspiration

Venture took a group of enthusiastic Year 11 students to the muchcelebrated Vincent Van Gogh: Poets and Lovers exhibition at the National Gallery in London.

The visit was organized to inspire the students as they work on their GCSE art portfolios by allowing them to explore Van Gogh's world-famous masterpieces in person.

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This special exhibition brought together some of Van Gogh's most cherished paintings from museums and private collections across the globe. Many of these works are rarely exhibited publicly, making the event a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for students and art lovers alike. What made this exhibition even more extraordinary was the pairing of Van Gogh's vibrant paintings with his

remarkable drawings, offering a more comprehensive look

into his creative process and emotional depth.

The students were captivated by iconic works such as Starry Night Over the Rhône (1888), a breathtaking view of the night sky illuminated by stars and reflected in the waters of the Rhône river. They also saw The Yellow House (1888), on loan from the Van Gogh Museum, a piece that reveals the artist's deep connection to his surroundings during his time in Arles. The National Gallery's own Sunflowers (1888) was a particular highlight, its bright yellows and rich textures reminding students of Van Gogh's ability to transform everyday subjects into something extraordinary. Another significant piece was Van Gogh's Chair (1889), a simple yet powerful representation of his own identity and artistic style.

The opportunity to see such masterpieces up close left the students inspired and motivated, fuelling their artistic ambitions. Their sketches, notes, and reflections from the day will serve as the foundation for their own art portfolios, helping them incorporate the boldness, emotion, and innovative techniques that Van Gogh is so well known for.

The visit to the Poets and Lovers exhibition was an unforgettable experience for the Year 11 students, as it not only brought them face to face with Van Gogh's artistry but also showed them how one's passion for life, poetry, and love can be channelled into creative expression. This exhibition may well influence their future work, encouraging them to take risks, explore new techniques, and view the world with the same depth of emotion that Van Gogh did.



Four Venture students from our Combined Cadet Force (CCF)—Poppy, Joe, Harry, and Ben—embarked on an exciting and challenging experience at RAF Barnham. The adventure tested their leadership, survival skills, and teamwork over the course of two action-packed days.

Day 1: Thursday - Shelters, Survival, and Navigation

Upon arrival, the students' first task was to hand over their mobile phones—a symbolic start to their immersion into the wilderness. Without distractions, they were immediately tasked with building their own shelters, using natural materials and resources around them. This exercise was designed to teach them the importance of shelter-building in the field, a crucial survival skill for any cadet.

After setting up their temporary homes for the night, the cadets were introduced to field cooking techniques and basic safety drills. Learning how to cook outdoors with limited resources not only tested their self-reliance but also prepared them for any scenario they might face in real-world operations.

As night fell, the cadets faced their next challenge: a night time navigation exercise. Led by the students themselves, this activity was designed to sharpen their map-reading, compass skills, and ability to move in low-visibility environments. The cadets successfully navigated the terrain, gaining confidence in their leadership and teamwork skills.

Once the exercise was complete, the students returned to their shelters to camp down for the night—sleeping in the very structures they had built earlier that day.



Day 2: Friday - Camouflage, Concealment, and Tactical Movement

Friday kicked off with lessons in camouflage and concealment. The cadets were taught how to blend into their surroundings using natural materials, a critical tactic for remaining undetected in the field. They then moved on to patrolling techniques and silent movement drills, focusing on minimizing noise and avoiding detection—skills essential for any successful mission.

The culmination of their training came in the form of a large-scale exercise. The group was split into squads and tasked with sneaking up on their instructors without being seen. The challenge tested their ability to apply all the skills they had learned—camouflage, teamwork, stealth, and strategy. Each team worked together, carefully planning their approach and using the environment to their advantage.

The weekend at RAF Barnham was a resounding success, with all four cadets showing tremendous progress in their skills and leadership. Poppy, Joe, Harry, and Ben demonstrated resilience, creativity, and a strong ability to work together in challenging conditions. Their time on base provided invaluable handson experience, preparing them for future CCF exercises and beyond.

Well done to all the cadets for their effort, focus, and teamwork throughout the weekend. This experience was a true testament to the spirit of the CCF—building confidence, resilience, and leadership through practical adventure.

How to CPR

As part of Venture's CASH curriculum (Community, Ambition, Spirituality, and Health), students are taught essential first aid skills, including how to respond to asthma attacks, allergic reactions, and head injuries.

A key component of this curriculum is the inclusion of CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation) and defibrillator training, as required by the National Curriculum.

Since 2021, Ormiston Venture Academy has proudly trained around 800 students in these life-saving techniques, thanks to the invaluable support of the British Red Cross. This October, 180 Year 8 students participated in CPR workshops delivered by Capricia and her team as part of the Red Cross' Community Education outreach programme. In addition, Year 9 students who missed their training due to the Covid-19 lockdown were given the opportunity to catch up.

The three-day sessions aligned perfectly with the UK's national 'Restart a Heart' week on 18th October. Students learned how to place someone in the recovery position, perform chest compressions, and use a defibrillator. Capricia and her team used 'Little Annie' resuscitation dolls to give students hands-on practice with CPR techniques.



Jack, a Year 8 student, remarked, "It's really useful to know how to help someone who isn't breathing—it could save a life one day." Another student, Sara, added, "Practicing on the doll helped me understand how to do chest compressions properly."

Spencer Doggett, Lead for the CASH programme, emphasized the importance of the training:

"It's alarming to hear that over 6,000 people in the UK die each year because they aren't placed in the recovery position. This 60-minute training provides skills for life that could save a loved one or even a stranger. Capricia shared a story of a former student who used these very skills to save a life—proof that this training has a lasting impact."

Through these workshops, Venture equips students with vital life-saving knowledge, ensuring they are prepared to respond in emergencies now and in the future.

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The Computer Science Department at Ormiston Venture Academy took a mix of 45 year 9 and 10 students to The Centre of Computing History in Cambridge.

Students were divided into three groups to participate in 4 different activities throughout the day. One session included a lesson on the world's largest processor. This allowed students to consolidate their knowledge and understanding of the FDE cycle, which has just been covered in the curriculum.

This session was particularly interesting, as it allowed our students to see the Fetch Decode Execute cycle in action. It was created By James Newman between 2014-2016 and holds the Guiness World Record for the largest processor. "Computers are quite opaque, looking at them it's impossible to see how they work. What I would like to do is get inside and see what's going on. Trouble is we can't shrink down small enough to walk inside a silicon chip. But we can go the other way; we can build the thing big enough that we can walk inside it. Not only that we can also put LEDs on everything so we can see the data moving and the logic happening. It's going to be great"- James Newman.


They were also introduced to early memory and shown how technology has reduced in size and cost but increased in capabilities.

This was delivered by Steven Goodwin who used to work in the games design industry and has also published several books. Game Development - The Career of Steven Goodwin - Veteran Game Developer - from the Marquis de Geek. It was great to hear this explained with Steven's level of enthusiasm and love for the subject.

Another session included a programming lesson, controlling external objects. This was called Pi Power and took place in the 80's style classroom. This was an opportunity for students to show off their programming skills to make a remote-controlled buggy to be programmed and move based on inputs from the code. This really helped improve some students confidence with programming and showed possibilities outside of the classroom.

The third guided session was a tour around the amazing artefacts the museum as curated. This allowed the students to add some vital contextual information

to the knowledge they have gained in the classroom. Specifically seeing how computers have developed over time. Students were shocked by how large old machines and technology were and I believe this has given them a new appreciation for the devices we use every day. This was delivered by Tim Hoverd who spoke of his experience writing early programs and the creation of chips/processors and gave an insight into how they are made so small (1 micron).

Students also had the opportunity to explore the games zone, where they were able to play a timeline of game evolution, playing original versions of favourites such as Tetris, Pacman, Sonic and Street Fighter. Students were all determined to set some high scores.

Head of CS and Trip leader, Lewis Riches said, "The Visit to The Centre of Computing History embeds itself perfectly into our curriculum adding vital contextual information to support students existing knowledge. It is a place which we have enjoyed visiting in the past and plan to continue in the future for other groups of students. It is nice to see how the museum evolves between each visit and having industry expert volunteers makes the experience that much more impactful. Students were fantastic throughout the day and really valued their experience ".

Many students commented on how they enjoyed the day and a number of them really enjoyed the opportunity to visit somewhere new. For many this was their first school trip.

"The day was really good, I had fun exploring the old games in the gameszone, Playing Streetfighter on the original arcade machine was cool" – Riley.

Year 10 Students Explore Geology & Ecosystems at East Norfolk Sixth Form Centre

A group of enthusiastic Year 10 GCSE Geography students had the unique opportunity to delve deeper into their geology and ecosystems studies during a visit to East Norfolk Sixth Form Centre's Earth Science department.

The morning was packed with engaging, hands-on activities designed to enrich their understanding of key topics from their GCSE curriculum.

The students began their visit with an Earth Science lab lesson, where they explored the fascinating concept of biomimicry—the practice of drawing inspiration from nature's designs to solve human challenges. They learned why having a biology specialist in every design studio could revolutionize innovation by incorporating natural efficiency and resilience into products and structures.

Next, the students donned lab coats and took on the role of young geologists in an interactive geology lab. The highlight of the session was an experiment to



investigate the impact of craters in different rock types. Using flour and cocoa powder trays to simulate surface layers, they created craters by dropping marbles from various heights.

The students meticulously measured their results, analyzing how the size and depth of the craters varied depending on the height and energy of the impact. From their data, they constructed graphs to demonstrate the relationship between impact force and crater size, applying key scientific principles to a real-world context.

Great Yarmouth Celebrates the 71st Festival with Joyful Christmas Performances

The 71st Festival in Great Yarmouth marked the beginning of the Christmas season for many in the local community. Held on Wednesday 6th and Thursday 7th December 2023 at the Drill Hall, the festival brought together students, families, and music enthusiasts for a celebration of carols and festive songs.

Planning for the event began as early as July, with rehearsals taking place throughout the autumn term. Students from local primary schools, alongside participants from Caister Academy and Lynn Grove Academy, joined forces to perform a selection of Christmas classics.

Empowering Students Through Dynamic Workshops



IntoUniversity Great Yarmouth recently partnered with Ormiston Venture Academy to deliver a series of transformative workshops for students in Years 7 to 10.

Over two days, the sessions focused on providing students with key skills to break down barriers to higher education, in line with IntoUniversity's mission of expanding opportunities for young people.

Every year, Venture takes on the challenge of breaking a Guinness World Record, fostering teamwork, creativity, and excitement among its students and staff.

Over the years, the academy has achieved several notable feats, beginning with an official World Record for the most high-fives with a

mascot—Vinny the Venture Raptor—in just three minutes. Following that, in 2020, they set another record for the greatest number of paper airplanes in the air simultaneously.

After a hiatus due to Covid restrictions, the academy returned in 2022 with an unofficial record-breaking attempt: the highest number of times a balloon could be bounced on a cotton bud within 30 seconds. The enthusiasm carried into 2023 when they discovered a Birmingham school's world record for the largest PE lesson. Set in May 2022 at Edgbaston Cricket Ground with 645 students, Ormiston Venture Academy surpassed this in September 2024, with 843 students participating in a series of drills organized by the PE department.

In January 2025, the academy took on a completely new challenge. After researching indoor records, the UVS (Unified Venture Student council) voted to attempt the record for the most teabags thrown into a mug from 1.5 meters in 30 seconds. With the record standing at just seven, it was seen as a fun and achievable target.

Students practiced diligently, with teabags and mugs provided for training sessions. Each college identified their top thrower, and the best performers were invited to the grand World Teabag Throwing Championship, held in the school café on Friday, January 10th. The finalists included Codey (Achieve), Cameron (Aspire), Ava (Create), and Ethan (Innovate). Representing the staff was Mr. Edwards, who had impressed during practice sessions.

With mascot Vinny cheering them on, the event culminated in an exciting showdown. Mr. Edwards tied the existing world record of seven on his first attempt, securing the top spot. Codey and Cameron followed in second and third places, earning valuable

points for their respective colleges in the first College Clash of 2025.

Spencer Doggett, Director of Personal Development, reflected on the event:

"It's wonderful to see our students come together as one big team, enjoying themselves while taking on unique challenges. Attempting to beat a world record requires coordination and planning, but most importantly, it's about having fun—and it looks like everyone did just that!"

Ormiston Venture Academy continues to prove that breaking records is not just about the achievement itself but about fostering collaboration, creativity, and a sense of community.

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Year 11 Rugby


A fantastic effort from our Y11 boys Rugby Team as they narrowly crash out of the Norfolk Rugby Schools cup.
