### Just before Easter, Venture's Union of Venture Students (UVS) held its 4th Baraza of the academic year.

The Baraza, named after an East African tradition, where villagers would hold a regular public meeting asking for change, has been responsible for genuine shifts from the students in our academy community. Director of Personal Development and lead staff member of the UVS Spencer Doggett commented, "It's the British Value of democracy in action, offering opportunities for student leaders across the academy to vote upon suggestions other members make; just like a national parliament does." Nearly 200 students were in attendance, with nearly 30 members also outside at the same time, planting 200 trees as part of our eco project.

The order of business was as follows; The progress made since the last Baraza, including the local charities students voted to support. A total of £750 has so far been raised, to be divided between Comic Relief, and also two local charities; the Freshly Grated (A local homeless charity) and Young Carers.

Students were reminded about the Eco Projects we currently have running; the 'tree planting initiative' and the Active Travel Ambassadors project; both of which should help us to achieve the Green Flag eco award this year. 
#### A Journey Through Barcelona's Highlights

### Year 9 Computer Science tudents Visit:

### BLET HLEY PARK

Home of the Codebreakers



At the end of Spring Term
2, 41 Year 9 students from
Venture's Computer Science
Department took part in an
exciting educational visit
to Bletchley Park in Milton
Keynes—the iconic site at the
heart of Britain's World War II
codebreaking efforts.

This popular annual trip, open to all Year 9 students, is a much-anticipated event on the school calendar. Upon arrival, students were organised into two main groups, which were then split into smaller teams to take part in a variety of independent activities.

A key highlight of the day was a guided tour of the Bletchley Park estate. Led by expert guides, students gained fascinating insights into the secret work carried out during the war. They learned about the strict confidentiality maintained on site, the daily routines of the codebreakers, and the key individuals—like Alan Turing—who played vital roles in breaking enemy ciphers. The students were highly engaged, asking thoughtful questions and showing great enthusiasm throughout.

Another memorable activity was a hands-on workshop on encryption and ciphers. Here, students explored a range of encryption techniques and compared them to the workings of the renowned Enigma machine. A particular highlight was the opportunity to use a fully operational Enigma machine—an extremely rare experience, especially given the machine's estimated value of £500,000. Bletchley Park is also home to the world's largest collection of Enigma machines.

During the visit, students were able to explore many of the original wartime outbuildings. They learned how the site, once a private country estate, was chosen as a highly secure base for wartime intelligence operations. The visit also illustrated the rapid expansion of the Government Code & Cypher School (GC&CS), which grew from around 150 staff before the war to nearly 10,000 by its peak.

Some groups viewed a compelling film presentation highlighting Bletchley Park's crucial role in the D-Day landings. The cinematic experience brought to life Operation Overlord—the largest amphibious invasion in history—revealing how intelligence gathered at Bletchley helped shape the success of the mission on June 6, 1944.

A visit to the Alan Turing exhibit offered students the chance to delve deeper into the legacy of one of Bletchley Park's most celebrated figures. The display detailed Turing's essential work in breaking the Naval Enigma,


his leadership of Hut 8, and his lasting impact on modern computing and artificial intelligence.

New to this year's itinerary was the innovative "Age of Al" exhibit. This interactive display connected the early computational breakthroughs made at Bletchley with today's developments in artificial intelligence. The exhibit featured a detailed timeline of Al's evolution and examined its effects on modern society, touching on both its benefits and the ethical and legal questions it raises.

Reflecting on the trip, Mr. Riches, the visit leader, shared:

"All students had a fantastic time, capturing moments through photos and fully immersing themselves in history. The experience will provide valuable context for our upcoming lessons on encryption next half-term."







### Last year, the Union of Venture Students (UVS) participated in our very first Active Travel Ambassador (ATA) program.

This consisted of 5 sessions in our training room, a presentation and the all-important campaign to make change. Part of this was an opportunity to present to a panel of experts at a 'Campaign Junction Event'; pitching ideas for more environmentally friendly travel to and from our academy.

So this year, we signed up again! The big event, presenting our ideas for more sustainable travel took place on Tuesday 1st April at County Hall in Norwich. Venture was one of four schools bidding for funding to put our ideas into action.



The travel experts listened to all the pitches, before deciding on funding of up to £200 for each school, with an extra £50 awarded to the academy with the best ideas.

This event was to share ideas, increase the profile of the ATA program and for schools and Local Authorities to meet and network.

The Active Travel Ambassador program's vision is for a society in which active and sustainable travel is the preferred mode of transportation, creating healthier spaces, healthier people and healthier communities.

By committing to the program, the ATAs at Venture hope to establish genuine change, while having fun.

#### Venture's ATAs presented the following:

- Spot prize reward for those walking/cycling to school on a Wednesday
- A Gold, Silver and Bronze bike lock to be placed on two winning bikes each Wednesday for a special prize
- Ice-cream for the PL group on each college with the most Wednesday walkers/cyclists

Additionally, an extra £50 was asked for, for an initiative for staff; two prizes to encourage walking, wheeling and lift sharing in the summer term.

This year we took a ten person team, including three Year 7s. It was great to see our Union of Venture Students (UVS) working as one and having the confidence to present in the way they did. The expert panel commented, 'your presentation was amazing-well done.' The campaign took coordination and planning, but the students were up for the challenge and I am proud of the entire team.

**Twenty students from Ormiston Venture Academy embarked** on an exciting trip to Trinity College, Cambridge, organised by IntoUniversity on 28th February.

The visit aimed to give students a first-hand experience of higher education and encourage them to explore future pathways to university.

The day began with a guided tour of the college, where students explored its stunning historic grounds and gained insight into life at one of the world's most prestigious universities. A visit to the Wren Library was a particular highlight, where they had the rare opportunity to see books that are over 500 years old including A.A.Milne's original 'Winnie the Pooh'.

Students also met two student ambassadors - one studying Medicine and the other Modern Foreign Languages (MFL) - who shared their experiences of university life. They spoke about academic challenges, the independence of university study, and the vibrant social opportunities available.

In the afternoon, students took part in a workshop, where they worked to present an invention or a discovery. The experience helped to build their confidence in public speaking and reinforced the possibilities that university could offer them.

A highlight of the trip was lunch in the Great Hall, an unforgettable experience as they dined beneath the imposing portrait of Henry VIII.


# Year 10 Students Capture Norwich's Architecture on Photography Field Trip

The visit provided them with valuable insights into Higher Education, university studies, and student living.

The group set off from Venture eager to explore what university life entails. Their day began with an introduction talk, followed by an interactive Q&A session with current UEA students. This opportunity allowed the Year 9s to ask candid questions about university life, gaining first-hand knowledge and advice from those already studying at UEA.

Next, the students embarked on a guided campus tour, exploring key areas of student life.

They visited accommodation facilities, including a bedroom and communal kitchen, as well as the university library, a lecture theatre, the Hive (food court), and the LCR, a venue that hosts gigs and student events.

A highlight of the visit was a myth-busting session, where the students engaged in discussions about common misconceptions surrounding university life. This was followed by a well-earned lunch and a workshop outlining the benefits of pursuing a degree. To conclude the day, the group took part in a quiz on Higher Education and university life—an activity in which many of the Venture students impressively scored 9 out of 10!

Adding to the excitement, the students had an unexpected but delightful encounter with former Venture student Chloe, who was on her way to a lecture. This real-life connection reinforced the accessibility of university and inspired the students even further.

The trip provided an invaluable opportunity for the Year 9s to see firsthand what studying at university entails. Experiencing the vast campus, exploring student accommodation, and interacting with current students helped bring Higher Education to life.

Hopefully, this visit has inspired them to strive towards their academic goals and consider university as an exciting option for their future.

Year 10 & 11 dive into the History of Medicine

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As part of their preparation for the upcoming GCSE exams, our Year 10 and 11 History students took part in a specialist Medicine Through Time workshop.

We have been lucky enough to experience a series of creative workshops that have taken place at Ormiston Venture Academy and the Drill House in Great Yarmouth, engaging students in photography, animation, and Sound. These workshops aim to foster artistic expression among the youth while connecting them to the town's rich heritage.

The Winter Gardens, a Grade II listed Victorian glasshouse first constructed in 1878, has been closed since 2008. Thanks to a £12.3 million grant from The National Lottery Heritage Fund and an additional £4 million from the Government's Town Deal Fund, the iconic structure is set to be transformed into a year-round destination featuring indoor gardens, entertainment venues, and cafes. The restoration project emphasizes community involvement, with plans to provide skills and training opportunities for 95 young people, including those not currently in employment, education, or training.

Winter Gardens - Illuminate! project is an exciting digital media exploration and celebration that brings together video, still images, sound, text, animation, archive materials, and new content. This artistic initiative will be shared with audiences both online and through a projected video installation onto and inside the Winter Gardens building in March and April 2025.





As part of the ambitious restoration of Great Yarmouth's historic Winter Gardens, Illuminate is a project managed by Out There Arts in partnership with Great Yarmouth Borough Council and Funded by National Lottery Heritage Fund. The project involves 9 local schools and 220 students in total.



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#### **Collaboration with Local Artists**

Fifteen of our students have had the incredible opportunity to participate in this project, working alongside talented local artists to bring their creative visions to life. Through a series of workshops, they have engaged with various aspects of digital media and historical storytelling.

### **Exploring the Winter Gardens**

The first visit took our students to the Winter Gardens, where they explored the building and its fascinating past. They learned about its original purpose and journey—from its origins in Torquay to its relocation by barge to Great Yarmouth. To deepen their understanding, students participated in a photography workshop, working in three groups to focus on architecture, texture, and history. Using props and costumes, they creatively captured



different aspects of the building's story through their lenses.

### **Bringing Stories to Life Through Animation**

In the second workshop, held at the Academy, students collaborated with an animation artist. They first learned how to create a storyboard, mapping out their ideas visually. From there, they brought their concepts to life, working in either 2D animation or 3D clay modelling. Some students chose to depict the history of the Winter Gardens, highlighting its past use as a skating venue and its remarkable transportation from Torquay to Great Yarmouth.



#### **Continuing the Creative Journey**

The third workshop will build on the students' animation work, allowing them to refine and develop their projects further. This hands-on experience will enable them to enhance their storytelling techniques and digital skills.

### **Exploring Sound and Music**

The final workshop will introduce students to sound design, working alongside a musician. They will learn how to use sound creatively to complement their visual projects, adding another immersive layer to the final presentation.
